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Introduction

The United Nations Development Group (UNDG) defines **capacity** as "the ability of people, organizations and society to manage their affairs successfully," and **capacity development** as "the process whereby people, organizations and society as a whole unleash, strengthen, create, adapt, and maintain capacity over time" to achieve their own development objectives.

DPIDG¹ as part of the activities of its Development Account Project 1819G, in collaboration with the SIDS Unit of DSDG², are strengthen the capacity of selected developing countries in Asia and the Pacific (Fiji & Vanuatu) in organizing and mobilizing their institutions and public servants to enhance effectiveness and institutional coordination, public accountability, and engagement of key stakeholders in the implementation and review of the SAMOA Pathway and the SDGs. In Fiji, the project aims to enhance interlinkages between government agencies and or bodies in monitoring SDG Indicators.
