






UN Secretary-General's Report on "Our Common Agenda"

Our Common Agenda presents the <u>UN Secretary-General's</u> vision on the future of global cooperation through an inclusive, networked, and effective multilateralism.



Key Points of the Report

"Our Common Agenda" - It highlights that -

- ✓ we are at an <u>inflection point in history</u>.
- ✓ <u>humanity faces a stark and urgent choice</u>: <u>breakdown</u> or <u>breakthrough</u>.
- The COVID-19 pandemic has served as a <u>wake-up call</u> and <u>the world is experiencing its biggest shared test</u> <u>since WWII</u>. The pandemic is threatening
 - ✓ health, destroying economies and livelihoods
 - ✓ deepening poverty and inequalities.






Pakistan: an extreme weather event

Snapshot of SDG progres so far in Asia and the Pacific, 2021 (ESCAP 2022)







Governance challenges in addressing climate change

Climate Change is intrinsically linked to everything else

- Energy, land use, food, water, transportation, trade, development, housing, investment security
- Weak governance
- Lack of innovation
- A silo approach to problem-solving



What is Climate Action?



- The process of adjustment to actual or expected climate and its effects, in order to moderate harm or exploit beneficial opportunities. -IPCC
- Examples: Desalination processes and larger water tanks to deal with increased rainfall and risk of flooding in the Maldives, setting up early warning systems in Kiribati.
- COP26: UN Secretary-General Guterres recommended that 50% of climate financing be spent on adaptation.

It is time to go into emergency mode – or our chance of reaching net zero will itself be zero

- According to the IPCC, **emission levels should be reduced by 45% by 2030** compared to 2010 in order to achieve the 1.5-degree target
- □ However, a lowered ambition on decarbonization → Need to prepare for a world of 1.5 °and beyond → Increase in magnitude, intensity and frequency of extreme events
- ☐ To date, we have already reached **1.1 degree C** of warming, and impacts are already being felt in every region
- □ Variability across countries and regions → Implication on planning process and the need to invest in risk knowledge




Glasgow Pact on Climate Change

- Emphasizes the urgency of scaling up action and support, including finance, capacity- building and technology transfer, → International cooperation for resilience building
- 2. Recognizes the importance of **dem**and-driven technical assistance in building capacity to implement approaches... → **Coordination and targeting in assistance**
- 3. Acknowledges the important role of a **broad range of stakeholders at** the local, national and regional level, → Inclusiveness and localization
- 4. Acknowledges the importance of coherent action to respond to the scale of needs caused by the adverse impacts of climate change → Integrated approaches






Climate Change and COVID-19

- Private users and drivers with real time operation information



Since 1995 Scotland has implemented a national coordinated planning policy that addresses all water management issues on a catchment area-wide basis

Property developers, insurers & others engaged

Digicel Foundation: Disaster Preparedness Activities

- Pre-Hurricane actions taken for school network:
 - SMS tips are sent to school directors;
 - Phone credit is provided to directors to communicate with community members;
 - Directors are called to ensure that they are aware of the situation and to encourage them to open up the schools to those in need of shelter.
- Post- Hurricane actions taken:
 - School directors are called to find out if the schools have been damaged and if there other issues to report;
 - Foundation's engineering team performs school visits if necessary.




