### Executive Summary

UN DESA's Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG) provides capacity development support and policy advice to countries upon their request to strengthen governments' capacities to translate the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and other internationally agreed goals into institutional arrangements, strategies, and programs for effective service delivery and participatory, accountable, and inclusive decision-making processes. It does so through several modalities. It oversees the development of strategy guidance notes, undertakes peer-to-peer learning workshops, training of trainers, direct advisory support, and the development and implementation of capacity development projects.

### Overview

In the area of capacity development and in line with UN DESA's Plan of Action, the Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government:

- Provides support in building the capacity of Member States to operate strong, transparent, and responsive public institutions, that deliver whole-of-government, whole-of-society policies and practices, as a foundational element of the Department's work.
- Promotes digital transformation and frontier issues to move the world closer towards sustainable development for all.
- Supports the implementation of the Secretary-General's Our Common Agenda report.
- Supports the reinvigorated Resident Coordinator system through strategic support to country teams in the areas of governance and public institutions.

This report provides an overview of the capacity development activities that UN DESA/DPIDG conducted in 2022, including the substantive support provided to the reinvigorated UN Resident Coordinator system, the development of new strategy guidance notes and methodologies, requests it received from Member States and how these were addressed, and the key outcomes of its capacity development support. In 2021-2022, DPIDG received **91 official requests** for capacity development support.

### Activities at a Glance

In 2022, UN DESA/DPIDG:



Completed **10 Strategy Guidance Notes** to operationalize selected principles of effective governance developed by the Committee of Experts on Public Administration (CEPA).

---

Developed **1 Training Toolkit**, **3 Handbooks** and **2 Online Courses** for training purposes.



Provided substantive contributions to over **19 Common Country Analysis (CCAs)** and UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Frameworks (UNSDFCs).

Received **45 official requests** for capacity development support from UN Member States, of which **31 were addressed**, including 18 from developing countries, 3 from Least Developing Countries (LDCs), 3 from Landlocked Least Developing Countries (LLDCs) and 7 from Small Island Developing State (SIDS).



Undertook **40 capacity-development activities**, of which 13 were online events (with a total of 17 sessions), 7 were hybrid and 20 were held in person (with a total of 67 sessions during 27 activities).

**Trained over 9,851 public officials** across the world, of which over 285 from SIDS, 224 from LDCs and over 400 from LLDCs (based on available data).



Leveraged the **Curriculum on Governance** for the SDGs developed in 2021 by UN DESA/DPIDG and organized several trainings of trainers.

Organized **2 global conferences/forums**, including the SDG16 Conference and the Internet Governance Forum and **4 regional symposia/workshops**, respectively in Africa, Asia and the Pacific, Latin America and the Caribbean and the Middle East.



Implemented **8 capacity development projects**.

Achieved **gender parity** in its capacity development activities (based on the surveys sent to participants, **843 were female** and **863 were male**).





Acted as resource persons in **96 global, regional, or national events**.

Had **2221 DESA Facebook views**; **920 Zoom views**; **1127 YouTube views**, **4268 social media reaches** were reached through UN DESA/DPIDG led activities.



Partnered with **5 UN DESA divisions** (DSDG, DSID, EAPD, OISC, and SD), and over 40 entities, including governments, regional and international organizations and academia.

### Key Outcomes

In the area of **transformational leadership and new mindsets for SDG implementation**, UN DESA/DPIDG supported several countries.

In **Bhutan**, technical cooperation by UN DESA/DPIDG led to a **roadmap** for (i) the design and implementation of a scheme for succession planning and leadership development; (ii) the review of existing human resource development policies, programs, and practices to ensure effective implementation, and (iii) the establishment of a mechanism to monitor and review the implementation of follow-up actions.

In **Guyana**, UN DESA/DPIDG's support resulted in an agreement among various institutions, including ministries, authorities, regional councils, etc., to **establish** a new institutional arrangement for public sector transformation, i.e., **an inter-ministerial steering committee**.

In **Lao PDR**, UN DESA/DPIDG's support resulted in an agreement among all ministries to establish an **inter-ministerial steering committee for effective service delivery** and the development of an inter-ministerial policy, planning, and coordination mechanism for One Door Service Centers (ODSCs) in Lao PDR.

Through training of trainers' workshops, the National School of Public Policy in **Pakistan** has **mainstreamed the UN DESA Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs Toolkit on changing mindsets** in public institutions to realize the SDGs in the training curricula of mid-level and senior-level management courses. In addition, participants in the Annual Meeting of the Global Initiative on Building Capacities of Public Servants for SDGs Implementation on "Mainstreaming the SDGs in the Curricula of Schools of Public Administration, New

Mindsets, and Competencies" committed to further mainstreaming the SDGs into their courses or programs.

**In the area of participation and accountability**, UN DESA/DPIDG's support for promoting **Independent External Audits on the Credibility of Government Budgets** resulted in the refinement of the conceptual and analytical framework of the handbook on how Supreme Audit Institutions Assess and Address Budget Credibility.

In **Malawi**, UN DESA/DPIDG supported the development of **action plans to promote an accountable, ethical, transparent, and inclusive public service to accelerate progress on the SDGs**, leveraging digital government and building partnerships and cooperation for transparent and inclusive services.

**In the area of governance and public institutions for the SDGs**, UN DESA/DPIDG supported several countries from different regions of the world. Under the theme of "**Implementing and Promoting Effective Governance Principles to Leave No One, No Place Behind**", UN DESA/DPIDG brought together stakeholders from public institutions and schools of public administration to build capacity for strengthening institutions; leave no one behind; and leverage partnerships at local levels.

In **Africa**, the delivery of **Regional Webinars on Resilience and Recovery from COVID-19 through Sound Policymaking** increased civil servants' awareness of how the principles of effective governance for sustainable development and the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs can help countries in their efforts to recover from the pandemic. Still in **Africa**, UN DESA/DPIDG, in collaboration with the African Peer Review Mechanism Secretariat (APRM) and the Office of the Special Adviser to the President of Nigeria on SDGs (OSAP), enhanced peer-learning between African countries on Voluntary National Reviews (VNRs) preparations and means of implementation of the 2030 Agenda and Agenda 2063. The **Regional Capacity Building Workshop on Implementation of the UN Principles of Effective Governance** for Sustainable Development in Africa, organized by UN DESA DPIDG, DSDG and OISC, together with the African Peer Review Mechanism supported African countries, promoted a peer learning process and exchange of experiences, enhancing institutional capacities to accelerate the implementation of the **2030 Agenda and AU Agenda 2063**. Results from the virtual **Workshop on the Promotion of Intergenerational Equity for Sustainable Development** brought concrete and actionable suggestions to help countries develop national strategies.

In **Asia and the Pacific**, the **Regional Symposium on Effective Governance and Digital Transformation for Accelerating Implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and Addressing Global Challenges** promoted peer-to-peer learning on critical public governance issues, examined current and future trends, and provided new approaches and methodologies.



In **Latin America and the Caribbean, and in Asia and the Pacific Region**, the launch of the **Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs** raised awareness of the importance of strengthening capacities to improve effective governance in public institutions and drive transformational change to implement the 2030 Agenda. The Launch of the Curriculum generated interest in mainstreaming the Curriculum toolkits in the trainings of the schools of public administration in the different countries of the regions.

UN DESA DPIDG's support in **Jamaica** led to a recommendation for a **sustainability strategy to support the implementation of the revised and updated Ocean Coastal Zone Management (OCZM) Policy**, incorporating policy coherence and systems thinking.

In **Namibia**, in collaboration with UN DESA/EAPD and the UNRCO, UN DESA/DPIDG supported the government with the **establishment of functional inter-ministerial/ inter-institutional team(s)** that can respond to policy-related analytical needs. **Namibia** is a pilot country in Africa for the implementation of the **Climate Land Energy and Water Systems (CLEWS)** methodology, composed of both a modeling component and the establishment of institutional arrangements.

In **Cote d'Ivoire**, the national Workshop on "**Youth Engagement in Institution Building and Public Services Delivery for Sustainable Development After the Pandemic**" UN DESA/DPIDG enhanced the capacities of government officials working for and with youth as well as the capacities of youth-led civil society to contribute actively to support the implementation of the SDGs through institution building and public services delivery in countries emerging from conflict and on measures to track climate change and biodiversity.

The organization of **HLPF side events** enhanced the discussions of the HLPF by giving a broader and in-depth conversation on institution building and public services delivery in countries emerging from conflicts and on measures to track climate change and biodiversity.

Finally, UN DESA/DPIDG's project on "**Strengthened capacities of developing countries participating in the Belt and Road Initiative to advance the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development through enhanced development policy synergy, mutual learning and people-to-people exchange**" enhanced capacities of senior policymakers and public servants in selected LDCs, LLDCs and SIDS to plan, design and implement coherent, coordinated and harmonized national sustainable development strategies, policies and approaches to accelerate the implementation of the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs.

In the area of **innovation and digital government for the SDGs**, UN DESA/DPIDG supported several events and initiatives. Through the Global E-Participation Workshop on "**The Strategic and Policy Imperative of E-Participation for National Sustainable Development**," UN DESA built institutional and leadership capacities of the Member States to **strengthen e-**

**participation policies and implementation strategies for a more inclusive, participatory implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals.**

In collaboration with the **D-8 Organization for Economic Cooperation, which includes Bangladesh, Egypt, Indonesia, Iran, Malaysia, Nigeria, Pakistan, and Turkey**, UN DESA/DPIDG organized an online and in-person Capacity-Building Workshop on Adopting New Approaches to E-Government for SDG Implementation. As a result of the Workshop, **D-8 members agreed to create an e-government network or working group to be supported by the D-8 Secretariat.**

UN DESA/DPIDG, in collaboration with the China National Academy of Governance (CNAG) and Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences (SASS), organized a capacity-building webinar on **Implementing a Multi-Pronged Strategy for Digital Transformation: Lessons from Asia.** Participants discussed challenges and shared lessons learned at the country and municipal levels on accelerating digital transformation by developing a funding partnership for investing in digital infrastructure.

In addition, UN DESA/DPIDG co-organized and participated in-person and online during a National Workshop on **“Regulatory Sandbox on Central Bank Digital Currency,”** held in Male, **Maldives.** The participants reviewed the national studies on gaps, opportunities, and risks of **“Central Bank Digital currency”** in the Maldives.

In **Kazakhstan**, UN DESA co-organized with UN ESCAP and the Ministry of Energy of Kazakhstan a workshop on Digital Platform for Energy Producers in Kazakhstan, under the implementation of Development Account project 2124B on Regulatory Sandboxes and a national **Workshop in Astana on Data Policy**, in partnership with the Ministry of Digital Development, Innovations and Aerospace Industry (MDDIAI) of the Republic of Kazakhstan, and the AIFC Tech-Hub. The workshops resulted in enhanced knowledge/access to technical expertise to create a regulatory sandbox to test the digital energy platform and promote innovation for public service delivery, including through data and ICTs in Kazakhstan, respectively.

With the Training of Trainers (ToT) on the UN DESA Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs Toolkit on “Innovation and Digital Government for Public Service Delivery,” UN DESA/DPIDG supported Schools of Public Administration and Institutes of Training from countries of **Asia and the Pacific Region, including from Bangladesh, China, Indonesia, Japan, Nepal, the Philippines, Republic of Korea, Singapore, Thailand, and Viet Nam.** The Workshop built a pool of competent trainers from public administration schools and institutes of training who can train their civil servants on the topic.

In the area of local governance, UN DESA/DPIDG supported **Cambodia** with the training of Trainers Workshop on Effective National to Local Public Governance for SDG Implementation. The training resulted in enhanced understanding of the Cambodian SDGs Framework 2016-

2030 (CSDGs) and how it was implemented at the local level and identified various innovative financing mechanisms to advance local SDG implementation. In addition, the National School of Local Administration (NASLA) of the Ministry of Interior, Royal Government of **Cambodia** will adapt the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs to the Cambodian context and collaborate with UN DESA, UNRCO, UNDP, and ADB to co-design the curriculum based on the needs of the local level.

UN DESA/DPIDG, through an online webinar focusing on applying the **Local Online Service Index (LOSI) methodology in Jordan**, enhanced the capacities of public sector officials to promote e-government at the city level.

With the **Online Workshop on Risk-informed Governance, Climate Action, and Finance Mechanisms for Local Resilience** UN DESA/ DPIDG-UNPOG brought together officials from **Afghanistan, Argentina, Bangladesh, Cambodia, Ethiopia, Fiji, Ghana, India, Indonesia, Laos, Nepal, Nigeria, Pakistan, Philippines, Republic of Korea, South Sudan, Sri Lanka, and Uganda** to discuss issues related to disaster risk management, climate change adaptation, building resilience, innovative finance mechanism for climate action and sustainable development.

In **Vanuatu**, the support of UN DESA/DPIDG/UNPOG resulted in an agreement on a set of recommendations to the Council of Ministers on improving national-to-local institutional coordination and monitoring mechanisms, as well as recommendations for provincial action plans to be implemented in accordance with the Nasara Sector Strategy 2022-2026, "Building Resilient Governance, Representation, and Inclusion for a Safe, Secure, and Prosperous Vanuatu."

### Major Global Conferences/Forums in 2022

The **Goal 16 Conference** provided a platform for fostering knowledge sharing and collaboration, promoting multi-stakeholder and inter-sectoral action, and catalyzing innovative and creative thinking and action. The outcomes of the Conference were presented in the form of the Rome Declaration on SDG 16, which included the commitments, recommendations, and action plans made by the participants toward advancing people-centered governance in a post-pandemic world.

The 2022 IGF on the overarching theme "**Resilient Internet for a Shared Sustainable and Common Future**" featured more than 300 sessions and special High-level, Parliamentary, and Youth Tracks. More than five thousand stakeholders participated, including over three thousand onsite.

## 1. Development of Guidance Notes, Toolkits, Handbooks and Online Trainings for Capacity Development

### 1.1. Strategy Guidance Notes

#### What are the 11 Principles of Effective Governance for Sustainable Development?

The 11 principles of effective governance for sustainable development, developed by the Committee and endorsed by ECOSOC in July 2018, aim to provide practical, expert guidance to interested countries on a broad range of governance challenges associated with the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. They highlight the need for pragmatic and ongoing improvements in national and local governance capabilities to reach the [SDGs](#). The principles are linked to 62 commonly used strategies for operationalizing responsive and effective governance, many of which have been recognized and endorsed over the years in various UN forums, resolutions and treaties.



#### How can the principles be operationalized?

The Committee of Experts on Public Administration (CEPA) has developed a wide range of commonly used strategies for operationalization of the 11 principles. DESA/DPIDG has been working with global experts to prepare guidance notes and provide content to the strategies to support full implementation of the principles and the 2030 Agenda. The notes include information on how a government can both assess its current status and measure progress in applying the strategy to national policymaking processes and implement the 2030 Agenda. All the notes have recent case studies and good practices to advance the principles with practical and illustrative guides.

#### What Guidance Notes were developed in 2022?

In 2022, 4 strategy guidance notes on the principle of **intergenerational equity** were completed.

#### Key highlights

To promote prosperity and quality of life for all, institutions should construct administrative acts that balance the short-term needs of today's generation with the longer-term needs of future generations. *Impact assessment for sustainable development* is a structured process for considering the implications of proposed actions for people, communities and the

environment, while there is still an opportunity to improve (or, if appropriate, abandon) the proposals. The strategy guidance note observes its contribution to all levels and types of decision-making that involve proposals that have the potential to change, for better or worse, environmental and social systems in significant ways.

The note on *long-term public debt management* explains that the development of strategies to effectively mobilize and use available financial resources, while maintaining debt at sustainable levels, is critical for both long-term needs and indebtedness of future generations. *Long-term territorial planning and spatial planning* is understood as the process of policymaking that systematically considers the place-based aspects and impacts of multiple policy goals in a coordinated way. This results in minimizing trade-offs and contradictions and maximizing synergies to achieve better places with more compact urban development that are socially inclusive. *Ecosystem management* involves using ecological knowledge about a particular ecosystem's structure and function to achieve a desired set of objectives. By setting and working toward appropriate objectives that are grounded in sustainability, ecosystem management can be an effective tool for public administrators and others to promote intergenerational equity within the framework of sustainable development.

In addition, 2 strategy guidance notes were developed for the principle of **leaving no one behind**.

### **Key highlights**

To ensure that all human beings can fulfil their potential in dignity and equality, public policies are to take into account the needs and aspirations of all segments of society, including the poorest and most vulnerable and those subject to discrimination. *Promotion of social equity* requires a cross-governmental commitment to eradicate inequality at all levels, through the country's formal and informal institutions and applied to the formulation and implementation of public policy, finance and budgeting, and in the administration of programmes executed or funded by the State.

The note on *systematic follow-up and review* examines how countries assess implementation of the sustainable development goals at the local, national, regional and global levels. It considers how countries have conducted their reviews, including what policy adjustments may be needed in order to more effectively include and benefit those at risk of being left behind, and what lessons may be useful for and transferable to other contexts and countries. Two other strategy guidance notes on the *promotion of equitable fiscal and monetary policy* and on *data disaggregation*, both for the principle of leaving no one behind, are in preparation and will be completed in early 2023. DESA/DPIDG also completed another note on participatory budgeting (for the principle of participation).

### 1.2. Training Toolkit on Capacities for Digital Government Transformation

Based on the UN E-Government Survey 2020, DPIDG/UNPOG developed a Toolkit on Capacities for Digital Government Transformation. The Toolkit consists of six modules:

- General introduction on the importance of promoting and accelerating digital government transformation for realizing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.
- A holistic approach to digital government transformation.
- Conducting a situation analysis to assess capacity gaps.
- Envisioning to advance digital government transformation.
- Developing a strategy and roadmap for digital government transformation and capacity development; and
- Monitoring, evaluation and learning for promoting digital government transformation.

During the process of developing the Toolkit, innovative cases and new findings from the 2022 UN E-Government Survey were also incorporated. This Toolkit can be used as a complement to the Toolkit on Innovation and Digital Government for Public Service Delivery.

### 1.3. Handbook Series on Innovative Local Governance for the Implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals

#### Handbook on Promoting Local Innovation for Inclusion of People in Vulnerable Situations and Leaving No One Behind

DPIDG/UNPOG developed a Handbook on Promoting Local Innovation for Inclusion of People in Vulnerable Situations and Leaving No One Behind, as part of the Handbook Series on Innovative Local Governance for the Implementation of the SDGs. The Handbook consists of five chapters on:

- Strengthening inclusive and participatory governance for engagement of people in vulnerable situations in local policy processes.
- Providing inclusive local public services.
- Leveraging ICTs and digital government for inclusion and empowerment of people in vulnerable situations.
- Fostering innovative partnerships; and
- Building an inclusive mindset and developing capacities of local government officials and other stakeholders.

Each Chapter provides strategies, approaches and innovative cases, as well as suggested action steps for local government officials based on a framework of eight integrated building blocks, i.e., people, vision, strategy, governance, process, partnerships, technology, and monitoring & evaluation.

### **Handbook on Effective National to Local Governance for Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation**

UN DESA/DPIDG/UNPOG developed a Handbook on Effective National to Local Governance for Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation to introduce concepts, approaches, tools, exercises and innovative cases relating to climate change mitigation and adaptation. ## **2. Strategic Support to the Reinvigorated UN Resident Coordinator System through Contributions to the Common Country Analysis**

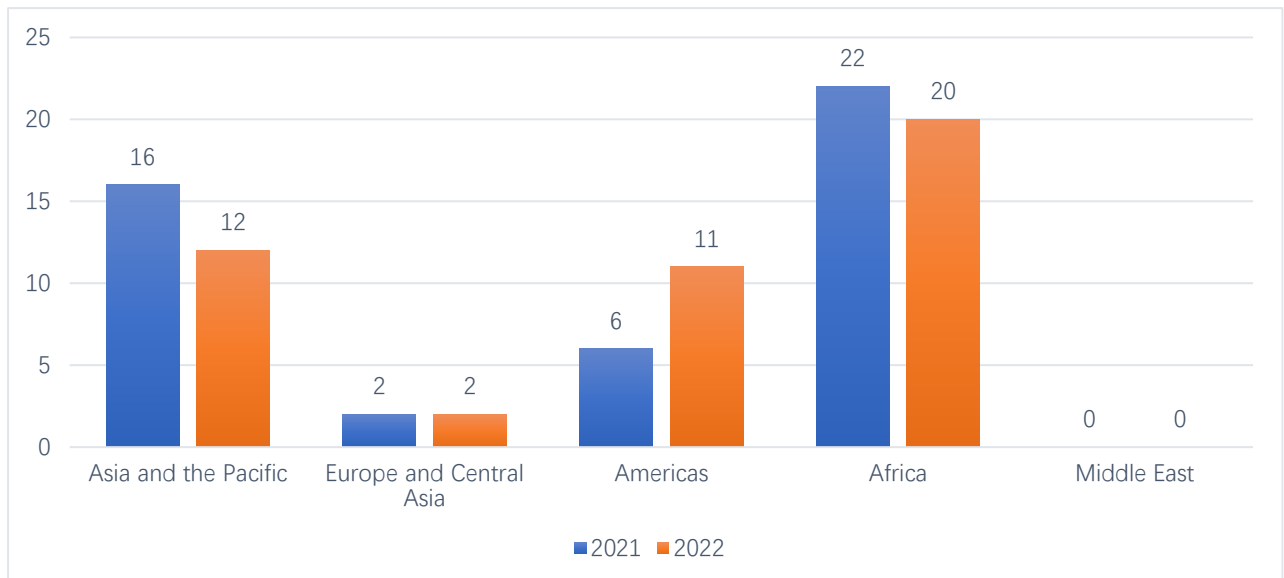
In 2022, DPIDG continued to provide strategic support to the reinvigorated UN Resident Coordinator System by contributing to over 19 Common Country Analysis and to UNSDCF in close collaboration with the UN DESA/OUSG Focal point. The Countries/ Regions supported include Burundi; Chad; Democratic Republic of Congo; Dominican Republic; Gambia; Ghana; Jordan; Madagascar; Mauritania; Mauritius; Morocco; Pacific region (17 states); Sao Tome and Principe; Senegal; Seychelles; South Sudan; Uganda; UNSDCF Nepal; UNSDCF Pacific. In addition, UN DESA/DPIDG’s capacity development activities were conducted in collaboration with UNRCOs.



### 3. Member States' Requests for Capacity Development Support

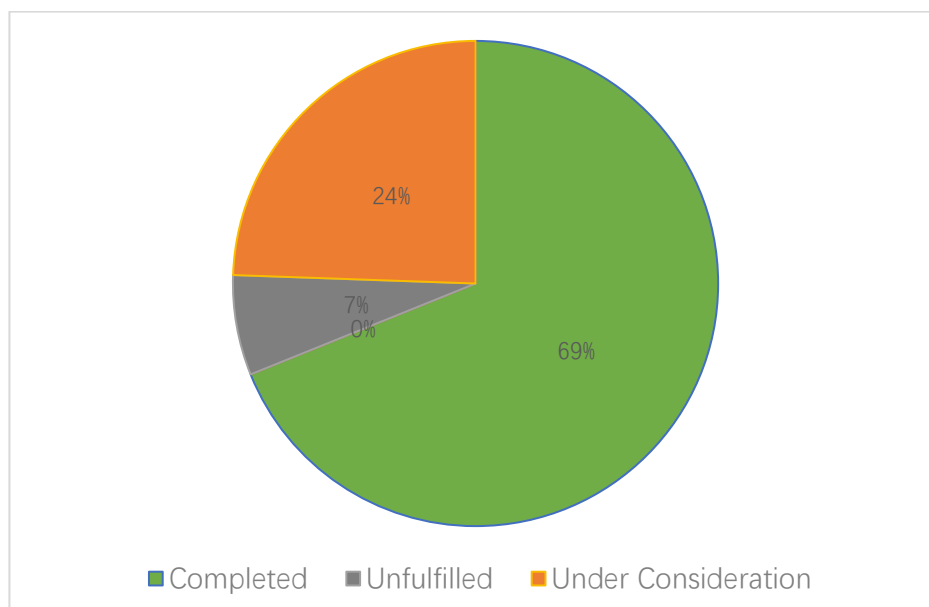
During the period 2021-2022, DPIDG received **91 official requests** for capacity development support (see Graph 1 below), with **45 requests** in 2022 of which **31 were supported in 2022** (see Table 1). Most requests have been entered into UN DESA's online CD Repository while others are being uploaded.

In 2022, 31 (69%) requests were fulfilled 24% of the requests (11 requests) are under consideration and 7% of the requests (3 requests) are unfulfilled (see Graph 2 and Table 2 below).

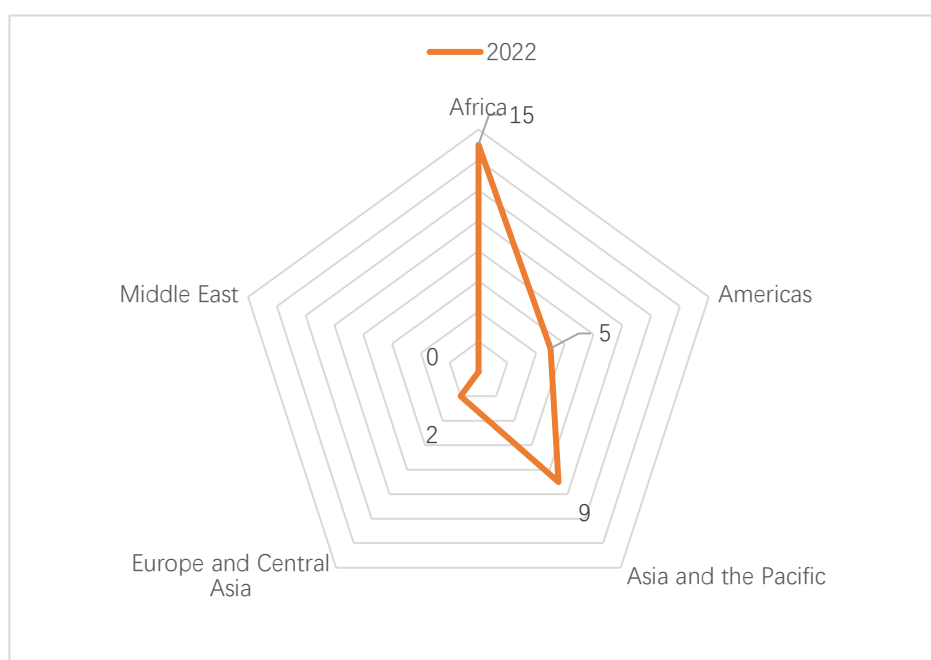

## 4. CD Activities by Thematic Area

UN DESA/DPIDG conducted its capacity development activities within the division's five key thematic areas, namely (1) Transformational Leadership and New Mindsets for SDGs Implementation; (2) Participation and Accountability; (3) Governance and Public Institutions for the SDGs; (4) Innovation and Digital Government for the SDGs; (5) National to Local Governance. The activities are hereby organized in chronological order within each thematic area. 7 activities were undertaken under the thematic area (1); 3 activities under the thematic area (2); 13 activities under the thematic area (3); 9 activities under the thematic area (4); 8 activities under the thematic area (5). Overall, the feedback received was very positive. The trainings and activities undertaken resulted in concrete outcomes, such as the design of a roadmap for effective national to local public governance for SDG implementation in Cambodia as reflected in the country stories.

### Thematic Area 1: Transformational Leadership and New Mindsets for SDGs Implementation

#### 1. Capacity Development Training Workshop on Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to realize the 2030 Agenda in Pakistan

**Date:** 24 – 28 January

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, United Nations Resident Coordinator Office in Pakistan, National School of Public Policy of Pakistan



DPIDG conducted a five-day capacity development workshop on “Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Realize the 2030 Agenda in Pakistan” based on the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs toolkit on the same topic. The Workshop was organized together with the National School of Public Policy (NSPP) of Pakistan and in collaboration with the Resident Coordinator Office in Pakistan. The Training Workshop was organized as a segment of the National Management Course (NMC), held at the National Management College, which is an integral unit of NSPP. 37 public officials took part in the training. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Pakistan to provide support in strengthening capacities to change mindsets (CD#4170).

**Objective:** The Training Workshop on “Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Realize the 2030 Agenda in Pakistan” aimed to promote a change of mindsets in public servants to realize the 2030

Agenda. Strategies and capacity development activities aimed at changing public servants' mindsets are essential to promote institutional transformation, helping to address the SDGs. Changing mindsets requires a holistic approach that considers strategies at the individual, organizational and institutional levels.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The target audience included public officials performing senior roles in public institutions. Overall, 96% of the respondents were either "very satisfied" or "somehow satisfied" with the outcome of the Workshop. Moreover, 91% of the participants are likely to apply what they have learned during the Workshop.

Some key messages from the Workshop include: (i) Transformation and innovation are needed to implement the transformative 2030 Agenda; key mindsets include learning, collaborative, and transformational leadership mindsets. (ii) A more experimental way of working will boost the readiness of public institutions to tackle the SDGs and become catalysts for change. (iii) Approaching challenges by using systems thinking and other innovative tools are essential to tackle the interconnections among the SDGs and their targets. (iv) A collaborative mindset is key for implementing the SDGs in a coordinated way, and (v) Peer-to-peer learning from various countries can be a valuable tool to promote change and adopt innovative solutions

## 2. Peer-to-Peer Learning International Workshop on Public Service Training Assessment Framework for Strengthening Capacities of Public Servants to Support SDG Implementation



**Date:** 16 – 17 March

The Royal Civil Service Commission (RCSC) of the Government of Bhutan, in collaboration with UN DESA/DPIDG and its Project Office on Governance (UNPOG), and with the support of the UN Resident Coordinator Office in Bhutan, organized a virtual peer-to-peer learning international workshop on public service training assessment framework for strengthening capacities of public servants to support the implementation of the SDGs. The workshop was a follow-up activity to UN DESA's Development Account Project on Institutional arrangements for policy integration, coordination and stakeholder engagement in SDG implementation and reviews in Asia & the Pacific. The workshop was attended by 102 participants from 6 countries and various UN entities. 68 government officials were from Bhutan. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Bhutan to provide support in human resources development (CD#4019).

**Objective:** The workshop aimed to promote a learning journey of peers to help strengthen civil service capacity building in Bhutan, leading to the development of a Public Service Training Assessment Framework (PSTAF).

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback** Through the Peer-to-Peer Learning Workshop, participants (1) Uncovered common challenges and roadblocks to the implementation of the public service training assessment framework (PSTAF); (2) Enhanced their awareness of the various approaches and methodologies adopted by different countries to overcome some of the challenges in the design and implementation of the PSTAF, (3) Identified the key elements of a PSTAF; (4) Established pathways for follow-up mechanisms for further peer-to-peer learning; and (5) Developed recommendations for a customized public service training assessment framework. The Workshop provided a platform for practitioners and decision-makers of the RCSC in Bhutan and its affiliated institutes to learn lessons from international good practices. Panelists have shared knowledge about various frameworks and approaches to enhance training effectiveness through assessment of learning outcomes while focusing on implementing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

A post-event evaluation survey was carried out among participants from Bhutan. Forty (40) evaluation responses from the participants were collected following the workshop. Overall, 97.5 percent of the participants were satisfied with the workshop. Out of the total, 65 percent were very satisfied, and 32.5 percent of the participants were somewhat satisfied. Responding to the question "How likely are you going to apply what you have learned in the Workshop?", 70 percent of the participants responded that they are very likely to apply the knowledge gained, and 30 percent of the participants are somewhat likely to apply the knowledge and insights learned in the workshop.

### 3. Capacity Development Training Workshop on Innovation, Digital Government and Changing Mindsets for Public Sector Transformation in Guyana to Achieve the Sustainable Development Goals



**Date:** 22 – 31 March

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, Ministry of Public Service of Guyana, Caribbean Centre for Development Administration (CARICAD), Caribbean Community (CARICOM), and the United Nations Resident Coordinator Office in Guyana

DPIDG in collaboration with the Ministry of Public Service of Guyana, the Caribbean Centre for Development Administration (CARICAD), the Caribbean Community (CARICOM), DSDG/SIDS Unit and with the support of the Resident Coordinator Office, organized the Training Workshop on Innovation, Digital Government and Changing Mindset for Public Sector Transformation in Guyana to Achieve the SDGs. More than 70 Permanent and Deputy Permanent Secretaries, Regional Executive Officers, Chief Executive Officers of Guyana participated in the Workshop. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Guyana to provide support in changing mindsets in public institutions (CD#3878).

**Objective:** The Training Workshop aimed to raise awareness and develop capacities to promote innovation, digital government in public service delivery and changing mindsets. The objectives of the Training Workshop were to (1) uncover challenges and identify building blocks for public sector transformation; (2) learn and apply new concepts, tools, and approaches in the areas of changing mindsets, innovation, and digital government, to support strategies, capabilities, and action planning; (3) explore strategies to strengthen Guyana’s capabilities, as they relate to the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs, for innovative, inclusive, and effective public service delivery; and (4) establish follow-up mechanisms.



**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The workshop ended with the participants co-designing a roadmap for public sector transformation and the proposal to create an inter-ministerial steering committee to take forward the roadmap. The Ministry of Public Service in Guyana expressed deep appreciation to UN DESA for the work done. Fifteen (15) post-event evaluation survey results were collected after the workshop. Overall, 93 percent participants were satisfied with the workshop. Out of the total, 46 percent were very satisfied and 47 percent participants were somewhat satisfied. Responding to the question "How likely are you going to apply what you have learned in the Workshop?", 73 percent of the participants responded that they are very likely to apply what they have learned, and 27 percent of the participants are somewhat likely to apply the knowledge and insights learned in the workshop.

## 4. Workshop on "Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Realize the 2030 Agenda in Pakistan"

**Date:** 22 - 23 August 2022

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, United Nations Resident Coordinator Office of Lahore in Pakistan



DPIDG, in collaboration with the United Nations Resident Coordinator Office (UNRCO) in Pakistan, supported the National Institute of Management (NMI) of Lahore in Pakistan to deliver the Workshop on Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Realize 2030 in Pakistan. DPIDG and UNRCO supported NMI in preparing every aspect of the workshop. UNPOG staff also supported this activity by delivering presentations. In addition, in June, DPIDG and UNRCO delivered a training of trainers to the staff of NMI to strengthen their capacities to conduct the workshop. On 22 and 23 August, NMI and UNRCO, with the support of DPIDG, delivered a capacity development training

to senior-level civil servants in Pakistan. The NSPP is embedding the Toolkit on Changing Mindsets in their training at various levels. Around 48 public officials took part in the TOT.

**Objective:** The goal of the ToT was to increase cooperation among training management institutes and exchange of knowledge in promoting a change in mindset in public institutions to realize the 2030 Agenda. The Training Workshop aimed at (1) contributing to a change in mindsets of Pakistan's public servants to advance the 2030 Agenda; (2) increasing participants' understanding of the importance of having a vision for public sector transformation to achieve the SDGs; and (3) including, among others, the embedment of the toolkit on Changing Mindsets in NSPP's trainings at various levels.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The workshop was very well received. Participants mentioned that "changing mindset is critical to achieving the SDGs" and that the "workshop was a wonderful opportunity to learn about the SDGs."

The United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA), through its Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG), in collaboration with the Latin American and Caribbean Institute for Economic and Social Planning (ILPES) of the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) - organized a webinar to launch the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs in Latin America and the Caribbean Region. DPIDG and DPIDG/UNPOG, in collaboration with the UNRCO in Pakistan, supported the delivery of a capacity development workshop on Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Realize 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in Pakistan. The capacity development workshop was organized by the National Management Institute (NMI) of Lahore, Pakistan, which took ownership of the event organization, following the training of trainers conducted in June by DPIDG to the staff of NMI based on the UN DESA toolkit on Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Realize the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. 49 Senior-level civil servants across different government departments in Pakistan were trained. DPIDG/UNPOG delivered four presentations as well as provided a summary of the group discussions in four major sessions. The four presentations centered on: i) Why is Changing Mindsets and embracing new Competencies needed to implement the SDGs and to promote public sector innovation and transformation? ii) Experimental, Innovation and Transformational Mindsets; iii) Inclusive mindset; and iv) Digital Data Governance and Digital Mindset.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The NMI Capacity Development Workshop was a hybrid event, combining UNRCO in-person presence and online participation of DPIDG/UNPOG and DPIDG staff.

**Organized by:** United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA), through its Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG) and its United Nations Project Office on Governance (UNPOG), and in collaboration with the Asian Association for Public Administration (AAPA) and the Eastern Regional Organization for Public Administration (EROPA).

**Objective:** The 2022 Annual Meeting aimed to provide an opportunity for schools of public administration and institutes of training to present their progress in mainstreaming the SDGs in their curricula.

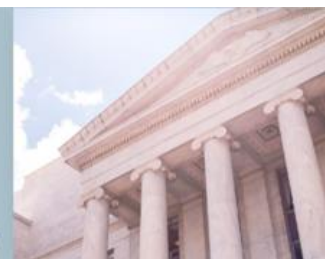
**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** Participants were invited to share their new courses, partnerships and/or case studies recently developed on strengthening public institutions' capacities to implement the SDGs. In addition, in view of the preparation for the 2023 SDG Summit, a survey on mainstreaming the SDGs in the Curricula of Schools of Public Administration will be administered to schools of public administration, institutes of training and civil service commissions from all regions of the world. Overall, all respondents were “very satisfied” or “somewhat satisfied” with the Annual Meeting. Furthermore, 87.5% of the respondents stated that the meeting enhanced their understanding of how schools of public administrations and institutes of training are progressing in mainstreaming the SDGs in their curricula.

### 8. Webinar on Promoting Independent External Audits on Credibility of Government Budgets: How Supreme Audit Institutions Assess and Address Budget Credibility

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, International Budget Partnership (IBP)

DPIDG and the International Budget Partnership (IBP) held a webinar on Promoting Independent External Audits on Credibility of Government Budgets: How Supreme Audit Institutions assess and address budget credibility on 16 June. The interactive event invited discussion of the results of a survey distributed to the members of the International Organization of Supreme Audit Institutions (INTOSAI) to learn about their experiences in auditing budget credibility (SDG 16.6.1). Speakers included representatives from the Audit Department of Jamaica, the Auditor-General of South Africa, IBP and UN DESA, among others. The webinar was attended by 21 participants in person, and 6 participants online. The Webinar was organized as a direct response to the request of Brazil to provide support in development of a handbook on budget credibility for Supreme Audit Institutions (CD#4132).

**Objective:** The objective of the Review Workshop was to convene selected staff from SAIs and other experts to take stock of the draft contents of the handbook and reflect on how to improve the draft materials, ensuring that the handbook is relevant and meets adequate quality standards.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The sessions sought to refine the conceptual and analytical framework of the handbook, discussed and provided feedback on the draft inputs submitted by the groups of experts engaged in the initiative, identify gaps and contents to be further developed, agree on relevant practices and examples to illustrate the handbook, and discuss key messages and lessons learned to be highlighted. Participants at the meeting discussed the timeline and next steps for the finalization of the handbook as well as dissemination activities. According to the post-event survey, 100% of respondents were satisfied with the workshop, and considered the meeting useful and relevant for the development of the handbook. 93% of respondents were satisfied with the clarity of the meeting objectives and considered that such objectives had been achieved. Furthermore, 93% of respondents were satisfied with the selection of participants and quality of

interventions, and 85% of respondents were satisfied with the selection of themes and sessions. Lastly, 70% were satisfied with the quality of documentation and materials for the meeting.

## 9. National Workshop on Transparency, Accountability and Ethics in Public Institutions



**Date:** 2 – 4 August 2022

**Organized by:** UN DESA/ DPIDG/ UNPOG, Office of the Ombudsman of Malawi, UN Resident Coordinator Office in Malawi, United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in Malawi

---

DPIDG/UNPOG, in collaboration with the Office of the Ombudsman of Malawi, UN Resident Coordinator Office in Malawi, and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in Malawi organized a 3-day National Workshop on “Transparency, Accountability and Ethics in Public Institutions” from 2 to 4 August 2022. 80 participants from national and sub-regional agencies attended the Workshop. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Malawi to provide support in ethics, transparency and accountability (CD#3663).

**Objective:** The Workshop aimed to convene key senior- to mid-level public officials from the Ministries, Departments, Agencies, and Units engaged in promoting issues on transparency, accountability, and ethics in public institutions.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** Expected outcomes of the Workshop included action plans on the approaches and skills for accountable, ethical, transparent, and inclusive societies to accelerate progress on the SDGs, leveraging digital government and building partnerships and cooperation for transparent and inclusive services.

About 95% of respondents indicated that because of the workshop, they were successful in understanding, obtaining, and applying the tools and competencies for strengthening effective governance for transparent, accountable, and ethical public institutions to achieve the 2030 Agenda. About 80% of the participants stated that they have gained insights on promoting government innovation and the role of Supreme Audit Institutions (SAIs) for transparent, accountable, and inclusive public services. One hundred percent of respondents indicated that the contents of the workshop were relevant to their job and found the workshop useful. Over 94% of the respondents indicated that the workshop would have a positive impact on their work. About 95% of the respondents indicated they were satisfied with the entire workshop.

## 10. 24<sup>th</sup> International congress of supreme audit institutions (INCOSAI XXIV) Side Event "Handbook on supreme audit institutions' contribution to strengthening budget credibility through external audits"

**Organized by:** UN DESA/DPIDG and the International Budget Partnership (IBP)

UN DESA/DPIDG and the International Budget Partnership (IBP) co-organized a side event on 9 November in the margins of INCOSAI XXIV to present the “Handbook on supreme audit institutions’ contribution to strengthening budget credibility through external audits”.

**Objective:** The side event aimed to disseminate key messages of the handbook to raise awareness among the global community of Supreme Audit Institutions (SAIs) and stakeholders about the current audit practices to assess budget credibility (SDG 16.6.1). It was attended by 130 participants (20 in person plus 110 online).

**Outcomes and Participants’ Feedback:** The discussion highlighted some of the opportunities, challenges and lessons learned from current experiences and audit practices related to budget credibility. Participants also reflected on how audits related to budget credibility could be further promoted and institutionalized within the International Organization of Supreme Audit Institutions (INTOSAI). The side event was organized in a hybrid format, with both in-person and remote participation. Speakers included representatives from SAI Argentina, Brazil, Morocco, Indonesia, the Philippines and Zambia, among others.

Positive unintended results included: (i) the side event provided an opportunity to identify potential peer reviewers and to discuss progress and future plans with other SAIs that have not been directly involved in the development of the contents; (ii) the side event and the XXIV INCOSAI provided an opportunity to develop communication contents and products and to collect materials that can be used for the launching of the handbook and related communication materials in 2023; (iii) an informal meeting with the members of the group of SAI experts who participated in person was organized to discuss the peer review process, the format of the launching event in 2023, and to brainstorm on future follow-up activities in 2023.

**11. Regional Webinar in Africa: Resilience and Recovery from COVID-19 through Sound Policymaking - "Policy coherence in Africa in response to COVID-19"**



**Date:** 17 January 2022

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, Resident Coordinators Offices and the African Peer Review Mechanism

UN DESA, through its Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG), and in collaboration with the African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM) and with the support of Resident Coordinators Offices, held a series of virtual workshops on how to promote resilience and recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic in Africa through sound policymaking. The first webinar was held on 16 November 2021, the second one on 8 December 2021, and the third workshop was held on 17 January 2022. The Regional Webinar Series on Sound Policymaking in Africa was very well attended with over 800 participants from about 75 countries. The first webinar on Risk Management was attended by 197 participants from 50 countries. The second webinar on Strategic Planning and Foresight was attended by 376 participants from 73 countries. The third webinar on Policy Coherence was attended by 295 participants from 68 countries.

**Objective:** The objective of the webinar series was to (i) examine the current trends in sound policymaking in Africa; (ii) explore gaps in relation to institutional arrangements, national policies, among others, and (iii) explore opportunities for strengthening sound policymaking in the public sector.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** As a result of the Regional Webinar Series on Sound Policymaking in Africa, participants (1) uncovered common challenges and roadblocks to the promotion of sound policymaking; (2) enhanced awareness of how the principles of effective governance for sustainable development can help countries in their efforts to recover from the pandemic; (3) gained knowledge about policy coherence, planning and foresight, and risk management frameworks; (4) engaged in peer-to-peer learning with countries that have advanced on the issues of sound policymaking; (5) enhanced awareness of the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs and its toolkit on institutional arrangements for policy coherence; (6) established follow-up actions and defined capacity needs and priorities. The feedback received from the participants was also very positive. About 90% of participants stated that they were very or somewhat satisfied with the webinars. About 70% of the participants stated that they were very likely to apply the knowledge gained and about 25% said they would be somewhat likely to do so, with a total of 95% of participants stating that they would apply the knowledge gained in their daily work.

## 12. Capacity Development Webinar “Effective Governance for Transformational Change: Strengthening capacities, mindsets, and competencies of public institutions to build the next generation of public servants in the Asia-Pacific Region” - Launch of the Curriculum on Governance for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in the Asia-Pacific region



**Date:** 25 January 2022

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, UN ESCAP

The United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA), through its Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG), in collaboration with the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UN ESCAP), organized a regional capacity development webinar to launch the Curriculum on Governance for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) (the “Curriculum”) in the Asia-Pacific region. The Offices of UN Resident Coordinators in the region were invited to provide advice in contextualizing the training material to the national level context. The Webinar was attended by over 500 participants with 800 unique views via Zoom and 1,000 viewers via DESA Facebook live stream.

**Objective:** The Webinar aimed to raise awareness and assist governments in strengthening capacities to improve effective governance in public institutions and drive transformational change to implement the 2030 Agenda in the Asia-Pacific region. The Webinar also aimed at generating interest in mainstreaming the Curriculum in the trainings of the schools of public administration in the different countries of the Asia-Pacific region.

**Outcomes and Participants’ Feedback:** The Webinar was well received with active interaction by participants from national and local governments, schools of public administration, civil society organizations, academia, the private sector, and several UN entities, including RCOs, UNDP, UN-Habitat, UNESCO, UN Women, WHO and FAO. The Webinar further highlighted the importance of strengthening effective governance and strengthening capacities, mindsets, and competencies of public institutions to realize the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in the Asia-Pacific region. The Webinar also helped generate strong interest in mainstreaming the Curriculum in the training of the Schools of Public Administration in the Asia-Pacific region and beyond. According to the Participant Survey, 99.1% of the respondents were either “Very satisfied” or “Somewhat satisfied” with the Webinar and 98.6% responded that they are either “Very likely” or “Somewhat likely” to apply what they have learned from the Webinar.

## 13. Institutional Arrangements for Coherent Policy Formulation in the Areas of Climate, Land, Energy and Water Systems (CLEWS) in Namibia



**Date:** 7 – 9 February

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG and EAPD, the Namibia Resident Coordinator's Office, UN ECA, UNDP, FAO and the Namibian National Planning Commission

DPIDG and EAPD, the Namibia Resident Coordinator's Office, UNECA, UNDP, FAO and the Namibian National Planning Commission held a hybrid workshop in Swakopmund, Namibia, to launch the implementation of the capacity development project that aims at assisting the Namibian government with incorporating the Climate, Land, Energy and Water systems (CLEWS) model to support the assessment of strategies to achieve the Harambee Prosperity Plan II (2021-2025). The workshop was attended by 37 participants. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Namibia to provide support in institutional arrangements for the implementation of evidence-based decision-making processes based on the CLEWs Initiative to Strengthen the Agriculture Sector in Namibia (CD#4023).

**Objective:** The objectives of the workshop were to (1) present the CLEWs methodology to medium and high-level officials from the National Planning Commission (NPC), Ministry of Agriculture Water and Land Reform (MAWLR), Ministry of Mines and Energy (MME), Ministry of Environment, Forestry and Tourism (MEFT), the Namibia Statistics Agency and lecturers/researchers from the University of Namibia and the Namibia University of Science and Technology; (2) serve as an opportunity to discuss the CLEWs and how can it be adapted to the Namibian context to address the policy priorities of the participating ministries and institutions, with a focus on the priorities and challenges for the Agriculture Sector in Namibia; (3) focus on how the CLEWs approach can be

institutionalized in Namibia, considering Namibia's planning process, the elements needed for an institutional integration of CLEWs into the country's planning mechanisms, and the arrangements that are conducive to policy coherence for sustainable development.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** DPIDG's role in the project was to support the government with strengthening the institutional arrangements enabling integrated approaches to policy formulation - a gap that was highlighted in the country's second VNR (2021). DPIDG facilitated the discussions on the establishment of the working arrangements between different stakeholders (analysts, policymakers, and senior decision makers) required for inter-ministerial collaboration that can respond to policy-related analytical needs as they arise and to develop institutional coordination mechanisms that can resolve conflicts or inconsistencies between the relevant stakeholders. The RCO expressed an interest to incorporate CLEWS into the new UNSDCF developed in 2022. By the end of the workshop, the participants had a good understanding of the approach and agreed to concretize the work plan that to be implemented by the end of June in 2022.

### 14. Virtual Workshop on the Promotion of Intergenerational Equity for Sustainable Development

**Date:** 8 March 2022



**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG

DPIDG organized a virtual workshop on the Promotion of Intergenerational Equity for Sustainable Development. The workshop was attended by some 350 participants and was chaired by Ms. Aminata Toure, the former Prime Minister of Senegal and a member of the UN Committee of Experts on Public Administration (CEPA).

**Objective:** The workshop was intended to launch the strategy guidance notes that were prepared to operationalize the principle of intergenerational equity, one of the 11 Principles of Effective Governance for Sustainable Development which were developed by CEPA.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The speakers presented concrete, actionable suggestions that could help countries develop national strategies which take into account the principle of intergenerational equity and raised a number of opportunities and challenges to ensure the full success of laws and policies which balance long- and short-term needs around the world. Suggestions for capacity building activities to further the principle of intergenerational equity were

made. According to the post-event survey, 98% of the participants were either “very satisfied” or “somewhat satisfied” with the webinar. Additionally, 98% of the participants expressed their willingness to apply what they had learned in the Webinar in their future work.

Participants, especially those from national governments, indicated strong interest in attending follow-up sessions and participating in capacity building activities. They were interested in working towards having an intergenerational collaborative approach on the national and municipal level; promoting the policy advocacy of intergenerational equity; ensuring integration of vulnerable groups of the society; integrating the SDGs in higher education; developing different policies based on the needs of specific countries; and conducting joint research, co-creation, and co-production with stakeholders and communities.

### 15. APRM-UNDESA Capacity-building Workshop on Africa's Voluntary National Reviews for the HLPF 2022 and domestication of Agenda 2063

**Date:** 28 – 30 March

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, DSDG, African Peer Review Mechanism Secretariat (APRM) and the Office of the Special Adviser to the President of Nigeria on SDGs (OSAP)

DPIDG and DSDG, in collaboration with the African Peer Review Mechanism Secretariat (APRM) and the Office of the Special Adviser to the President of Nigeria on SDGs (OSAP) held a joint workshop titled Africa's Voluntary National Reviews for the HLPF 2022 and Domestication of Agenda 2063 in Abuja, Nigeria. The workshop was attended by African countries, including the 21 countries due to present their voluntary national reviews (VNRs) at the High-Level Political Forum in July 2022, and SDGs focal points from 36 Nigerian states. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of APRM to provide support in VNR/VLRs and effective institutions for SDG implementation (CD #4097).

**Objective:** The key objectives of the APRM -UNDESA workshop were to: 1. Encourage peer-learning between African countries on VNR preparations and means of implementations of the 2030 Agenda and Agenda 2063, especially those presenting VNRs in the HLPF 2022 and countries in political transition; 2. Address key trends of SDGs progress in Africa; achievements, bottlenecks,

and implications especially goals under focus in 2022 alongside SDG 16; 3. Raise awareness on Agenda 2063 domestication and reporting tools. 4. Deliberate on the current regional and national efforts to foster financing for Agenda 2030 and Agenda 2063 alongside with cross-cutting issues such as civil society, youth, gender, and refugees; 5. Enhance knowledge of VLR guidelines for Africa alongside VNR guidelines; and 6. Share innovative tools for Implementation of the Principles of Effective Government for Sustainable Development developed by the Committee of Experts on Public Administration (CEPA).

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The workshop provided a regional platform for peer-learning on good practices for integration and implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and African Union' Agenda 2063 and provided the opportunity for countries to share experiences in institutional strengthening and localisation of the SDGs. Participants at the workshop drew up a set of key recommendations for submission to the President of ECOSOC. The workshop was followed by an event on Voluntary Local Reviews (VLRs) and the Application of the Principles of Effective Governance for Sustainable Development at the Sub-National Level for 36 states in Nigeria. According to the post-event survey, all respondents are either "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with the workshop. Moreover, about 92% of respondents were either "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with the workshop's achievement in supporting national capacities of African countries for VNR/VLR preparations. Also, every respondent expressed interest in talking to UNDESA and APRM on the capacity building needs of their countries.

### 16. SDG 16 Conference

**Date:** 21-22 April 2022

**Organized by** the Government of Italy, United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA), International Development Law Organization (IDLO)



The SDG 16 Conference 2022 addressed how a people-centred approach to governance can help rebuild trust, accelerate progress towards sustainable development and tackle the challenges facing a post-COVID world. The SDG 16 Conference brought together a range of experts from governments, the United Nations system, civil society, academia and other stakeholders through a hybrid format to address the following themes:

- Preventing conflict and sustaining peace in an increasingly fragile world.
- Building institutional resilience and enhancing the effectiveness, accountability and responsiveness of institutions.

- A new vision for the rule of law to address global challenges.
- Leaving no one behind: ensuring inclusion, protection and participation.

The Conference featured a range of high-level speakers and benefited from the online participation of approximately 1,000 participants. Participants came from 137 different countries, covering all regions.

**Objective:** The objective of the SDG 16 Conference 2022 was to support the reflection and actions of the international community on issues related to SDG 16 by facilitating inclusive stock-taking and dialogues on the challenges and opportunities for furthering people-centred governance in post-pandemic world.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The Conference deliberations provided a space for governments and communities working on SDG 16 to continue to reflect on the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic in their areas of work and identify promising avenues for progress. 91 percent of respondents were satisfied with the level and relevance of speakers. 88 percent of respondents were satisfied with the quality of interventions from speakers. 95 percent of respondents rated the Conference as useful for their work. 90 percent of respondents said the Conference raised their awareness on the topics

The United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA), through its Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG) and the Division for Sustainable Development Goals (DSDG) - SIDS Unit, in collaboration with the Resident Coordinators Office (RCO) in Jamaica and under the leadership of the Government of Jamaica, organized a Capacity Development Workshop on “National consultations for Interim Institutional Arrangements for advancing Ocean Governance in Jamaica” from 27 to 30 June 2022 in Kingston, Jamaica. The workshop was supported by UN DESA’s Development Account Project DA 1819b entitled “Bridging capacity gaps in the implementation of the 2030 Agenda, with a particular focus on SDG 14 and SDG 16” and it is its final activity. This event brought together representatives of Civil Society, Non-governmental organizations, relevant Government Ministries, and the private sector in two rounds of a consultative exercise. The total number of participants was around 30 persons. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Jamaica to provide support in institutional capacity to support ocean governance (CD #3999).

**Objective:** The purpose of the consultation was to strengthen Jamaica’s capacity to develop and implement appropriate enabling legal, institutional and policy frameworks to grow sustainable ocean-based economies and to derive economic benefits from harnessing the productive potential of their ocean spaces. It also aimed at eliciting recommendations from a variety of stakeholders on the institutional capabilities (experience, aptitudes, proficiency, and competencies) required to effectively coordinate and implement the review and revision of Jamaica’s national Ocean Coastal Zone Management (OCZM) Policy.

**Outcomes and Participants’ Feedback:** This event brought together representatives of Civil Society, Non-governmental organizations, relevant Government Ministries, and the private sector in two rounds of a consultative exercise.

## 18.HLPF 2022 Side-event "Building Back Better: Institution Building and Youth Engagement in Public Services Delivery in Countries Emerging from Conflicts"

DPIDG organized a Side-Event to the High-Level Political Forum, entitled Building Back Better: Institution Building & Youth Engagement in Public Services Delivery in Countries Emerging from Conflicts.

**Objective:** The Side-Event was aimed at contributing to enhance the discussions of the HLPF by providing a broader and in-depth conversation on institution building and public services delivery in countries emerging from conflicts.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The event, moderated by the Principal Inter-Regional Adviser at DPIDG, examined youth engagement in institution building and public services delivery considering SDGs 4 and 5. The presentations and the following discussion highlighted the need to create safe spaces for youth to be drivers in the establishment of strong and legitimate public institutions, and deliver effective public services for populations in countries emerging from conflicts. The Side-Event delved into issues such as education and training for the youth; the need to empower young women; the collaborations between academic research and policy making institutions; the role of youth in proactively creating spaces for themselves, as well as the need for financial resources to support development in various areas including in technology and innovation.

## 19.HLPF Side Event: Transforming Institutions to Build Back Greener: the Case for Natural Capital Accounting

**Date:** 12 July 2022



**Organized by:** UNDESA/The Committee of Experts on Public Administration (CEPA) and Committee of Experts on Environmental Economic Accounting

The Committee of Experts on Public Administration (CEPA) and Committee of Experts on Environmental Economic Accounting organized this side event, held on 12 July 2022, on the occasion of the high-level political forum.

**Objective:** The event examined how natural capital accounting (NCA) can help to measure and track climate change and biodiversity, thus providing all institutions with a “common denominator” in the effort to address climate change and biodiversity. It focused on NCA according to the international statistical standard, the System of Environmental-Economic Accounting (SEEA).

**Outcomes and Participants’ Feedback:** The event showed how using the tools and measures developed from the SEEA and recommended by CEPA as a basis for building the capacity of the public sector in natural capital accounting to promote better partnerships and inter-institutional collaboration and help provide the kind of integrated data needed to build back greener from the pandemic, in support of Agenda 2030, the post-2020 global biodiversity framework and the Paris Agreement.

### 20. Capacity-Building Workshop on Advancing innovative partnerships and inclusive governance in pursuit of the Sustainable Development

**Date:** 25 – 29 July, 2022

**Organized by:** UN DESA/ DPIDG, IASIA (International Association of Schools and Institutes of Administration) Conference



DPIDG held two capacity development activities in the context of the 2022 IASIA (International Association of Schools and Institutes of Administration) Conference, which was held under the theme of “Implementing and Promoting Effective Governance Principles to Leave No One, No Place Behind”. The workshop brought together roughly 30 people per session with 10 speakers. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Morocco to provide support in advancing innovative partnerships and inclusive governance in pursuit of the Sustainable Development Goals (CD#4184).

**Objective:** The workshop aimed at (1) building resilience and capacity of national public administrations to develop and enhance partnerships and build back better from COVID-19 to reach the SDGs, while focusing on enhancing innovation, technology and participation; (2) contribute to the Conference by focusing on three principles: Collaboration, Leaving No One Behind and Participation in the context of enhancing innovative partnerships and inclusive governance to reach the SDGs; (3) developing capacities of public officials in countries in special situations to promote inclusive governance and engagement of vulnerable groups.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The workshop, 'enhancing innovative partnerships to reach the SDGs' brought together stakeholders from public institutions and schools of public administration to build capacity in partnerships for strengthening institutions; partnerships to leave no one behind; and leveraging partnerships at the local level. The panel session, held as a plenary event to the Conference, focused on 'innovative governance for social inclusion of social groups' and was organized in collaboration with UNPOG. The panel discussed innovative ways to better include vulnerable social groups in governance and public service delivery. The Principles of Effective Governance and the Curriculum on Governance were also presented. A total of 24 participants (4 online) attended the session with three presenters. Outcomes of both activities were presented in the reporting plenary session. According to the survey after the panel session, 80% of respondents were satisfied or very satisfied with the facilitation and delivery of the panel. All respondents were either "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with the discussion and interactions, as well as the importance and relevance of the panel. Moreover, 80% were satisfied with the quality of the materials.

**Date:** 14 October 2022

**Organized by:** DPIDG/UNPOG and the Korea Institute of Public Administration (KIPA)

DPIDG/UNPOG and the [Korea Institute of Public Administration \(KIPA\)](#) co-organized the [2022 KIPA-UN DESA International Forum](#). The theme for the 2022 KIPA-UN DESA International Forum was Public Administration and Governance for Sustainable Development in the Era of COVID-19.

DPIDG/UNPOG organized the Session on Exploring Innovative Strategies for SDG Implementation which included thematic presentations on i) Strengthening Public Governance towards a Green and Sustainable Recovery from COVID-19: A Comparative Study between Bangladesh and Republic of Korea and ii) Strengthening Digital Data Governance for Achieving Climate Neutrality – An Effective Approach to Unlocking the Potential of Data and Digital Technology. With the presence of 130 live participants via YouTube from national and local government entities, public institutions across various fields, international organizations, the private sector, and the civil society, the Forum explored innovative public governance approaches and methods on leveraging digital transformation to achieve the 2030 Agenda and address climate crisis. The [YouTube video](#) had 764 views as of 18 October.

**Objective:** The Forum’s objectives were to: Examine the importance of public-private governance for the effective and sustainable achievement of the 2030 Agenda; Exchange different public governance approaches including the national and local-level strategies, institutional frameworks, and policy implementations for carbon neutrality; Discuss innovative country practices in public governance and strengthening digital data governance for climate neutrality; Exchange innovative solutions and suggest recommendations in strengthening public governance for a green and sustainable recovery from COVID-19; Share effective approaches in utilizing data and digital technologies for climate neutrality and in overcoming COVID-19.

**Outcomes and Participants’ Feedback:** The participants were able to enhance their understanding of how to strengthen public governance for a green and sustainable recovery from COVID-19 and acquaint themselves with the various innovative digital data governance approaches to achieving climate neutrality. The Forum was well-received by the participants. Overall, 91% of the participants rated the Forum as either “Excellent” or “Very Good” and more than 74% of the participants stated that they are highly likely to apply the contents of the Forum onto their work.

## 22. Regional Capacity Building Workshop on Implementation of the UN Principles of Effective Governance for Sustainable Development in Africa



**Date:** 27-29 October 2022

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM)

DPIDG, DSDG and OISC, together with the African Peer Review Mechanism, held a workshop entitled Strengthening National Institutional Capacities for the UN Decade of Action and Delivery for Sustainable Development and the AU Agenda 2063. This was the third annual Africa continental workshop designed to explore how effective, accountable and inclusive institutions and the principles of effective governance for sustainable development developed by the Committee of Experts on Public Administration (CEPA) can accelerate the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the African Union Agenda 2063. The event was attended by representatives of 25 African countries. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of APRM to provide support in the implementation of the UN Principles of Effective Governance for Sustainable Development in Africa (CD #4333).

**Objective:** The workshop was specifically designed to support countries, including through a peer learning process and exchange of experiences, to enhance institutional governance to accelerate the implementation of the 2030 Agenda and AU Agenda 2063 by (1) increasing understanding of how to strengthen institutional and governance gaps, including in the context of the recovery from COVID-19, through peer learning and exchange of experiences; (2) improving capacity to strengthen principles of effective governance for sustainable development and its application in institutional arrangements; (3) assisting countries in advancing coherent, integrated, evidence-based policy and planning frameworks for the implementation of the 2030 Agenda and Agenda 2063; (4) supporting African countries in sub-national implementation of both Agendas, including in VLR preparations.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** High-level experts from 25 African countries noted the cascading impacts of recent crises which have put the achievement of the 2030 Agenda and Agenda 2063 under threat and called for urgent and transformative action to regain progress. Participants also strongly urged African countries to prepare for and contribute to a successful 2023 SDG Summit.

According to the post-event survey result, all respondents were either “very satisfied” (83%) or “somewhat satisfied” (17%) with the workshop overall. 80% of respondents stated that the workshop provided lessons and good practices to overcome institutional and governance gaps. 17% of the respondents were of the opinion that this was done “to some extent”. Moreover, 90% of respondents indicated that the workshop had increased their understanding of the relevance of the principles of effective governance for sustainable development, and the other 10% felt that this was done “to some extent”. 90% of respondents indicated that the workshop was relevant and useful to their professional needs and conditions in their countries, by rating it as “excellent” or “very good”, whereas the rest 10% rated it as satisfactory. Lastly, 94% of respondents indicated that they would be interested in further support from the APRM and DESA in addressing capacity building needs of their countries and asked to be contacted.

## 23. Regional Symposium on Effective Governance and Digital Transformation for Accelerating Implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and Addressing Global Challenges



**Date:** 22-24 November 2022

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG-UNPOG, Ministry of the Interior and Safety (MOIS) of the Government of the Republic of Korea

The United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA) 's Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG), through its Project Office on Governance (UNPOG), and in collaboration with the Ministry of the Interior and Safety (MOIS) of the Government of the Republic of Korea, organized a Regional Symposium on "Effective Governance and Digital Transformation for Accelerating Implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and Addressing Global Challenges." The Regional Symposium was organized in a hybrid format and offered ample opportunities for online engagement to ensure wide-ranging participation, and more than 200 participants attended the event online from Asia & Pacific, Africa, Europe and Latin America. The Symposium was held in a hybrid format in Incheon, the Republic of Korea, from 22-24 November 2022. Government and non-government representatives from 23 countries across Asia and the Pacific and beyond gathered for three days to discuss how to strengthen governance across a region struggling to make up ground lost to COVID-19, climate change and extreme weather events. Overall, 304 officials from 149 countries participated in the event. 170 participants attended the event online and 130 participants participated in person.

The event featured 61 speakers, including UN DESA resource persons from DPIDG, the Statistics Division, the Office for Intergovernmental Support and Coordination for Sustainable Development, Division for Sustainable Development Goals and Financing for Sustainable Development Office.

**Objective:** The Regional Symposium on "Effective Governance and Digital Transformation" is a UN DESA flagship annual event in the Asia and Pacific region. It aimed to raise awareness of critical public governance issues, examine current and future trends and provide new approaches and methodologies to support the United Nations Member States in developing their capacities toward achieving the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. It also promoted peer-to-peer learning by providing participants with the opportunity to share knowledge and exchange innovative practices.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The Symposium received feedback from 105 participants. The survey analysis showed an overall rating of 'Extremely Satisfied' (71.4%) 'Very Satisfied'

(26.7%) and 'Satisfied' (19.9%). 74 respondents (70.5%) rated the interest and usefulness of the presentations as 'Highly Useful' while 27 respondents (25.7%) responded they were 'Very Useful' and 4 respondents (3.8%) rated them as 'Useful'. 81 respondents (77.1%) stated that they would 'Highly Recommend the Symposium to a colleague.

## Thematic Area 4: Innovation and Digital Government for the SDGs

### 24. Global E-Participation Workshop "The Strategic and Policy Imperative of E-Participation for National Sustainable Development"

**Date:** 10 – 11 January 2022

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG



UN DESA convened a Global Workshop on E-Participation, to share development trends, policies, and approaches of e-participation among Member States from both developed and developing countries, and from experts from the private sector, civil society, and other international and intergovernmental organizations.



**Objective:** The objective of this Global Workshop was to build institutional and leadership capacities in strengthening e-participation policies and implementation strategies for a more inclusive, participatory implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals. Specifically, it aimed to enhance the knowledge and capacities of national practitioners and professionals, as well as institutions, in the current concepts, policies, strategies and practices in engaging people in the policymaking and decision-making process, including in formulating and implementing national development plans and sustainable development strategies. It was attended by 47 participants.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** Supported by CDPMO through RPTC funds, this virtual Workshop was organized around two sessions with similar programmes but scheduled at different hours to accommodate the participation of countries in different time zones, with the first session joined by Azerbaijan, the Bahamas, Cabo Verde, Denmark, Mauritius, Portugal and the United Kingdom; and the second session joined by Bangladesh, Japan, Malaysia, Myanmar, Peru, Republic of Korea, Saudi Arabia and Singapore.

11 respondents found the workshop's overall quality 'very satisfactory,' and 3 respondents found it 'somewhat satisfactory.' When asked for the probability to apply learned lessons from the Workshop, 10 respondents indicated 'very likely' and the remaining 4 indicated this to be 'somewhat likely.' Respondents were eager to implement the gained knowledge after the Workshop. When asked about what follow-up actions would be taken, responses varied from developing further knowledge, using the acquired knowledge in strategic policy-making and agency reorganization, knowledge-sharing and mainstreaming E-Participation engagements, and preparing knowledge on best case practices. Respondents also made suggestions on what they would like to acquire more knowledge on. These included: (1) Innovative practices in e-participation; (2) Change management to encourage e-Participation adoption; (3) Information on New Emerging Technologies and Open Government Data; (4) Data strategies and interoperability; (5) Base registries; (6) The role of AI and how it is supported; (7) Regulation; and (8) Further training, workshops, and UN DESA future events.

### 25. Capacity Building Workshop on New Approaches to Government for e-SDG Implementation



**Date:** 15 – 16 March

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, and D-8 Organization for Economic Cooperation

DPIDG, in collaboration with the D-8 Organization for Economic Cooperation, organized a capacity-building workshop on new approaches to e-government for SDG implementation. The event was attended by 32 participants.

**Objective:** The objective of the Workshop was to raise awareness of innovative approaches in e-government policies and implementation strategies and increase participants' capacities on how to use them to achieve the SDGs. In addition, the Workshop served as an important platform to share diverse country practices, challenges, and innovative cases on the use and implementation of ICT policies and strategies.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** As a follow-up, DPIDG in collaboration with the D-8 Secretariat organized an in-person Workshop later in the year based on countries' actual needs, which emerged during the webinar. According to the post-event survey, participants indicated that they generally increased their understanding of the existing and potential challenges to achieve better E-Government performance. 4 respondents found the Workshop's overall quality 'very satisfactory,' and 4 respondents found it 'somewhat satisfactory.' When asked about the probability to apply learned lessons from the Workshop, 4 respondents indicated this as being 'very likely,' 3 indicated this to be 'somewhat likely' and 1 respondent indicated 'neither likely nor unlikely.'

Respondents also made suggestions with reference to the areas where they would like to receive additional information on: (1) how digital transformation can be used in decision support systems in public administration and what kind of collaborations can be made; (2) Digital transformation; (3) E-Government Applications; (4) Data management, data sharing, data space establishment, big data and data ethics efforts in countries; (5) Single sign-on technologies; (6) calendar event, e-mail, newsletter and research.

### 26. Capacity Development Webinar on Implementing a Multi-Pronged Strategy for Digital Transformation: Lessons from Asia



**Date:** 7 July 2022

**Organized by:** UN DESA/DPIDG, China National Academy of Governance (CNAG) and Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences (SASS)

UN DESA/DPIDG, in collaboration with China National Academy of Governance (CNAG) and Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences (SASS), organized a capacity building webinar on [Implementing a Multi-Pronged Strategy for Digital Transformation: Lessons from Asia](#). About

500 participants attended the webinar with over 120 participants who followed the webinar via Zoom and over 340 participants who followed on DESA Facebook Live.

**Objective:** The objective of the webinar was to discuss challenges and share lessons learned at the country and municipal levels on how to accelerate digital transformation by developing a funding partnership for investing in digital infrastructure, by improving digital government services and digital economy, and by strengthening data governance. Several Asian countries with recent progress in these areas were invited to highlight national and local experiences, share lessons learned and identify ways forward.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** According to the Participants Survey, 100% of the respondents were "Very satisfied" with the Webinar and 93 percent of the participants stated that they are "very likely" to apply what they have learned in the Webinar, while 7 percent are "somewhat likely" to do so. Furthermore, 12 respondents out of the 14 noted that they are interested in further follow up on capacity building activities at national level on digital transformation.

**Organized by:** UNDESA/ DPIDG, ESCAP and the Maldives' Monetary Authority (MMA), and its Ministry of Environment, Climate Change and Technology (MECCT).

DPIDG/DESA co-organized, and participated in-person and online, during a National Workshop on "Regulatory Sandbox on Central Bank Digital Currency", held in Male, Maldives. The workshop was organized by DPIDG/DESA, ESCAP and the Maldives' Monetary Authority (MMA), and its Ministry of Environment, Climate Change and Technology (MECCT). Relevant domestic stakeholders, including 36 high-level officials from the MMA and MECCT, were in attendance.

**Objective:** The workshop was part of the United Nations Development Account 2124B, which aims to enhance the institutional capacity of Bangladesh, Kazakhstan, and the Maldives to understand and develop policy experimentation and regulatory sandboxes to accelerate the progress of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** Under the scope of the DA Project, Maldives has identified “Central Bank Digital Currency” (CBDC) as its key focus area. The workshop participants reviewed the national studies on gaps, opportunities, and risks of “Central Bank Digital currency” in the Maldives. In addition, DPIDG/DESA had a bilateral meeting on the sides of the workshop with Minister Shauna and Governor Hashim. General issues related to digital transformation and digital economic reform were discussed. Maldives indicated interest in further, ad hoc capacity development initiatives and workshops that may align with their policy and governance objectives in the areas of digital transformation and development.

### 28. United Nations E-Government Survey Local Online Service Index (LOSI) Webinar Series Episode 1 – Jordan



**Date:** 7 September 2022

**Organized by:** DPIDG / UN DESA

DPIDG / UN DESA organized an online webinar with a special focus on the application of the Local Online Service Index (LOSI) methodology in Jordan. The researchers that conducted the study presented their work related to the application of the LOSI methodology in 19 different cities in the country. Following the presentations, an interactive discussion session took place.

**Objective:** The webinar highlighted opportunities and challenges in e-government at city level while aiming at information sharing and capacity building.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The study pointed out considerable limitations in the LOSI assessment criteria, specifically those related to service provision, technology, and engagement features for the majority of the Jordanian municipalities' websites. The findings recommend governments to encourage residents' participation while strengthening collaboration with related government ministries and agencies. It also stressed the importance of user-centric portals and access to free Wi-Fi. The episode contributed to the promotion of the LOSI network while creating

an opportunity to highlight challenges and provide recommendations about e-government at the local level.

### 29. Workshop on Digital Platform of Energy Producers in Kazakhstan

UN DESA co-organized with UN ESCAP and the Ministry of Energy of Kazakhstan a workshop on Digital Platform for Energy Producers in Kazakhstan, under the implementation of Development Account project 2124B on Regulatory Sandboxes. The Ministry of Energy and Industry Centre of Technological Competencies in Kazakhstan (KOREM) developed a vision and prototypes of digital platforms for accounting fuel and energy resources, assessment and monitoring of the condition of equipment of energy facilities through “Digital Energy Platform”. UN DESA and UN ESCAP are supporting the government of Kazakhstan in implementing this project by facilitating exchange of knowledge/access to technical expertise and creating a regulatory sandbox to test the digital energy platform before scaling. The workshop was attended by the Vice-Minister of Energy of Kazakhstan, and over 100 participants representing key stakeholders in the energy sector, government and private sector players, UNDP Kazakhstan and international experts.

### 30. Workshop on Data Policy in Kazakhstan

DPIDG conducted a national workshop in Astana on Data Policy in partnership with the Ministry of Digital Development, Innovations and Aerospace Industry (MDDIAI) of the Republic of Kazakhstan, and the AIFC Tech-Hub. The workshop was organized within the framework of the implementation of joint UN DESA – Government of Kazakhstan project on “The Use of New Technology Policy Experimentation and Regulatory Sandboxes for Digital Transformation in the Republic of Kazakhstan: A Pilot Initiative”. The workshop was attended by about 100 participants. Mr. Bagdat Mussin, Minister of MDDIAI, UN Resident Coordinator in Kazakhstan, as well as experts from Estonia, Singapore, and the World Economic Forum (WEF) on Data Policy attended.

**Objective:** The workshop aimed to promote innovation for public service delivery, including through the use of data and ICTs in Kazakhstan and the thematic sessions allowed to identify government priorities in creating a policy framework and conducive ecosystem for better utilization of data for policy making.

UN DESA in collaboration with the D-8 Organization for Economic Cooperation which includes Bangladesh, Egypt, Indonesia, Iran, Malaysia, Nigeria, Pakistan, and Türkiye, organized a capacity-building workshop on adopting new approaches to e-government for SDG implementation. During the Workshop, a total of 30 participants took part in interactive exercises by using UN DESA’s Curriculum on Governance Digital Government Capability Assessment, and [UNESCO’s AI and Digital Transformation Competency Framework for Civil Servants](#). The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of D-8 Organization to provide support in adopting new approaches to e-government for SDG implementation (CD#4073).

**Objective:** The Workshop was designed to build the capacity of relevant officials, who are responsible for shaping the digital transformation policy, for answering to the ever-growing challenges they face in implementing their respective digital transformation agendas. The Workshop, which also served as a continuation of the [online Workshop](#) conducted in March 2022, addressed the challenges presented during the first event.

**Outcomes and Participants’ Feedback:** As a group, D-8 members also agreed in creating an e-government network or working group to be supported by the D-8 Secretariat. According to the survey after the workshop, all respondents were either “very satisfied” or “satisfied” with the quality and relevance of speakers, the quality of interventions from speakers, the management of the sessions, and the website and documentation.

### 32. 17th annual Internet Governance Forum (IGF)



17th Internet Governance Forum

**Date:** Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, 28 November - 2 December

**Organized by:** UN DESA/DPIDG/ IGF Secretariat



The 17<sup>th</sup> annual [Internet Governance Forum \(IGF\)](#) was held under the overarching theme “Resilient Internet for a Shared Sustainable and Common Future”. The week-long forum includes more than 300 sessions, organised around [five themes](#) that are aligned with the Secretary-General’s proposed Global Digital Compact. The opening ceremony featured addresses from [UN Secretary-General António Guterres](#), the President of Ethiopia, H.E. Mr. Abiy Ahmed, and the Under-Secretary-General for Economic and Social Affairs Mr. Junhua Li. The IGF was attended by 5,120 participants from 170 countries.

The 17th Internet Governance Forum (IGF) concluded after five days of multistakeholder discussions on Resilient Internet for a Shared Sustainable and Common Future. It featured more than 300 sessions as well as special High-level, Parliamentary and Youth Tracks. The Forum was held in a fully hybrid format that included several features to make onsite and online participation as equal as possible: a 3D venue, a participating platform, an online IGF Village, remote hubs, and features for online bilateral meetings and networking opportunities. More than **five thousand stakeholders** participated, including over three thousand onsite.

### 33. Training of Trainers Workshop on Effective National to Local Public Governance for SDG Implementation in Cambodia



**Date:** 10 – 17 May 2022

**Organized by:** UNPOG/DPIDG/UN DESA, in collaboration with the UN Resident Coordinators Office in Cambodia and UNDP Cambodia, National School of Local Administration (NASLA) of Ministry of Interior, Royal Government of Cambodia

At the request of the National School of Local Administration (NASLA) of the Ministry of Interior, Royal Government of Cambodia, the “Training of Trainers Workshop on Effective National to Local Public Governance for SDG Implementation in Cambodia” was held from 10 to 17 May 2022 in UNDP Cambodia. The training used the material from the Curriculum on Governance’s Toolkit on

National to Local Governance. It was attended by 17 trainers from the Ministry of Planning, NASLA, General Department of Administration, Phnom Penh Capital Administration and Siem Reap Provincial Administration of the Royal Government of Cambodia. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Cambodia to provide support in effective national to local public governance for SDG implementation in Cambodia (CD#3918).

**Objective:** The objective of the workshop was to strengthen public institutions to facilitate more coherent implementation of the SDGs while supporting greater integrated public governance, including through planning, policymaking and finance practices, between national and local authorities.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The Workshop resulted in the development of a roadmap on how to organize trainings based on the 5-day TOT workshop. NASLA will adapt the curriculum on governance for the SDGs to the Cambodian context and collaborate with UN DESA, UNRCO, UNDP and ADB to co-design the curriculum based on the needs of the local level. NASLA committed to organizing the first training by 2023. Participants specifically mentioned as key learnings: a clear understanding of the Cambodian SDGs Framework 2016-2030 (CSDGs) and how it is implemented at the local level; applying the principles of effective governance at all levels to achieve the 2030 Agenda; enhanced understanding of the whole-of-government approach and whole-of-society approach; and identified various innovative financing mechanisms to advance local SDG implementation. The Workshop was very well received by the participants. Overall, 94% of participants were entirely or mostly satisfied with the training, and 88% would recommend the training to their colleagues.

DPIDG/UNPOG organized an [Online Workshop on Risk-informed Governance, Climate Action and Finance Mechanisms for Local Resilience](#). The Workshop, consisting of 4 thematic sessions, shared insights on the significant role of risk-informed governance and delved into leveraging data and digital government for DRR and building resilience with reference to the Toolkit on [Risk-informed Governance and Innovative Technology for Disaster Risk Reduction and Resilience](#), which is part of UN DESA's [Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs](#). The Workshop brought together over 248 participants from 18 countries mainly from Asia-Pacific and Africa comprising of national and local government officials and other stakeholders from civil society and academia in the Asia-Pacific and African Regions who are supporting disaster risk management, climate change adaptation, building resilience, innovative finance mechanism for climate action and sustainable development. The countries included – Afghanistan, Argentina, Bangladesh, Cambodia, Ethiopia, Fiji, Ghana, India, Indonesia, Laos, Nepal, Nigeria, Pakistan, Philippines, Republic of Korea, South Sudan, Sri Lanka, and Uganda.

**Objectives:** 1. Support the localization and implementation of the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015-2030; 2. Introduce the Toolkit on Risk-Informed Governance and Innovative Technology for DRR and Resilience and specifically provide guidance on leveraging data and digital government for DRR and resilience; 3. Improve the understanding of the 11 principles of governance for the SDGs for building local resilience; 4. Examine the innovative finance mechanisms to implement the SDGs; 5. Explore the diagnosis tool for assessing resilience progress and preparing an evidence-based risk reduction and resilience planning and 6. Get familiar with Making Cities Resilient 2030 (MCR2030) and additional resources to enhance local resilience.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** About 97% of respondents indicated that as a result of the workshop, they are able to understand how to conceptualize the disaster risk finance framework for local resilience. Over 98% indicated that as a result of the workshop, they are able to understand the implications of risk-informed governance in the context of disaster risk reduction. About 95% of the responding participants stated that as a result of taking this training workshop, they are able to understand and apply the Ten Essentials for Making Cities Resilient to my own city/local context. Over 97% of the respondents specified they are likely to apply what they have learned from this online Workshop to their city/local context. Over 70% indicated the information presented in the workshop was new to them with 90% of all respondents stating they was the likelihood of applying the information acquired from this workshop to their cities/communities or organizations. Also,

about 92% of the respondents stated the content of the online workshop was relevant to their work/job. Overall, about 95% of the respondents indicated they were satisfied with the entire workshop. In addition, about 96% mentioned the presentation(s) / session(s) were interesting and useful to them. Around 90% expressed their commitment and willingness to recommend the workshop to fellow colleagues. Lastly, about 91% respondents found the course relevant to their jobs.

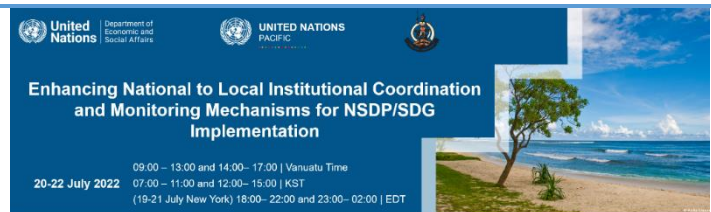

### 35. Workshop on Enhancing National to Local Institutional Coordination and Monitoring Mechanisms for NSDP/SDG Implementation in Vanuatu



**Date:** 20 – 22 July 2022

**Organized by:** DPIDG/UNPOG, DSDG/SIDS Unit, Department of Strategic Policy, Planning and Aid Coordination (DSPPAC) within the Prime Minister's office of the Government of the Republic of Vanuatu, the UN Resident Coordinator's Office and UNDP.

DPIDG/UNPOG with the support from DSDG/SIDS Unit, and in collaboration with the Department of Strategic Policy, Planning and Aid Coordination (DSPPAC) within the Prime Minister's office of the Government of the Republic of Vanuatu, the UN Resident Coordinator's Office and UNDP organized a Workshop on "Enhancing National to Local Institutional Coordination and Monitoring Mechanisms for NSDP/SDG Implementation in Vanuatu" from 20 to 22 July 2022. Thirty-five participants from national and sub-regional authorities attended the Workshop. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Vanuatu to provide support in enhancing national to local institutional coordination and monitoring mechanisms for NSDP/SDG implementation (CD#3903).

**Objective:** The Workshop convened key provincial officials and officials in ministries in Vanuatu to develop recommendations for improving national and local coordination in delivering the NSDP and SDGs.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The outcome of the workshop included the design of provincial development action plans and agreement on improved data collection and mechanisms for better monitoring and evaluation of progress towards achieving the SDGs with the full engagement of the whole society. The responses are very positive, with 78% strongly agreed and 22% agreed that the workshop was very useful. The participants were entirely (61%) or mostly (39%) satisfied with the workshop.

### 36. UN DESA-KRILA Forum on “Promoting Innovative Local Governance for Accelerating the Implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals & Building an Inclusive and Resilient Society in the Post-COVID-19 Era”

The UN Project Office on Governance (UNPOG), an integral part of the Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG) of UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA), and the Korea Research Institute for Local Administration (KRILA), in collaboration with the Jeonbuk Provincial Government of the Republic of Korea and with support from the Jeonbuk Center for Creative Economy & Innovation, co-organized a Forum on “Promoting Innovative Local Governance for Accelerating the Implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals & Building an Inclusive and Resilient Society in the Post-COVID-19 Era”. The Forum was attended by 343 participants from 50 countries.

**Objective:** The Forum aimed to share various approaches, strategies, and good practices in promoting innovative local governance for accelerating SDG implementation at the local level and building an inclusive and resilient local society in the post-COVID-19 era.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** A preliminary analysis of the Participant Survey shows that 91% of the respondents rated the Forum either as “Excellent” or “Very Good”, and 94% said they are “Very Likely” or “Likely” going to apply what they have learned in the Forum in practice.

### 37. Validation Workshop of the Climate, Land-use, Energy and Water Systems (CLEWs) Initiative to Strengthen the Formulation of Sectoral and National Development Plans in Namibia



**Date:** 23-24 November 2022

**Organized by:** UN DESA/ DPIDG & EAPD, the United Nations Resident Coordinator Office (RCO) in Namibia, the Development Program (UNDP) and the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa (UN ECA), KTH Royal Institute of Technology, FAO, and WFP Namibia

---

DPIDG and EAPD of UN DESA, in collaboration with KTH Royal Institute of Technology, UN ECA, UN RC Namibia, FAO, and WFP Namibia held a workshop to validate the proposed outputs developed during the Climate, Land-use, Energy and Water Systems (CLEWS) modeling capacity development process and those related to the establishments and implementation of the institutional arrangements required to embed CLEWS into the national development planning process (NDP6). The capacity-building initiative was launched in February 2022 following a request from the National Planning Commission (NPC) to support the government in transitioning from sectoral to integrated policy making. Overall, 29 public officials attended the validation workshop. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Namibia to provide support in strengthening the formulation of sectoral and national development plans in Namibia (CD#4336).

**Objective:** The objective of the validation workshop was to hold a 2-day workshop to affirm senior leadership's commitment towards using CLEWS assessments; Validate the proposed roadmap and institutional arrangement for implementation of CLEWS in Namibia; Validate the outputs developed during the CLEWS modelling capacity development process and those related to the establishments and implementation of the institutional arrangements required to embed CLEWS

into the national development planning process and Discuss and improve on the steps to be taken for the implementation of the CLEWS approach towards the formulation of the NDP6.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** During discussions between members from the technical working group and the Executive directors or their delegates from NPC, the Ministry of Mines and Energy (MME), the Ministry on Agriculture, Water, and Land Reform (MAWRL), the National Statistics Agency (NSA), the University of Namibia (UNAM) and the Namibian University of Science and Technology (NUST), an agreement was reached on steps to be taken for refining the CLEWS model, and establishing a CLEWS Steering Committee and a CLEWS Lab resource Center for conducting robust analytical work on integrated modelling, based at UNAM. Namibia will be the first country in Africa where CLEWS will formally be used to inform sectoral strategies and the next National Development Plan 6 that will be formulated in 2025.

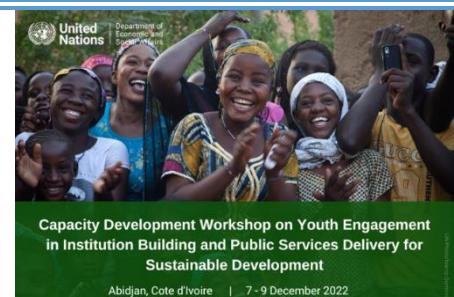

### 40. National Workshop on “Youth Engagement in Institution Building and Public Services Delivery for Sustainable Development After the Pandemic”

**Date:** 7-9 December 2022



**Organized by:** UN DESA/DPIDG in collaboration with the Ministry for Youth, Professional Insertion, and Civic Engagement, the National Youth Council, as well as UNDP and UNFPA in Côte d'Ivoire

---

The workshop was organized by UN DESA/DPIDG in collaboration with the Ministry for Youth, Professional Insertion, and Civic Engagement, the National Youth Council, as well as UNDP and UNFPA in Côte d'Ivoire on 7-9 December 2022. It involved other relevant national stakeholders in the government, NGO sector, civil society, and academia. This workshop was part of a pilot to a large initiative that aims to build on, and consolidate, previous work undertaken by UN DESA on “Youth Citizenship and Civic Engagement in Times of Pandemic” in this country (2021). It also built on the activities undertaken by DPIDG, in cooperation with the APRM, on enhancing the integration of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development into national policy frameworks, including the operationalization of the 11 principles of effective governance for sustainable development. The Workshop was organized as a direct response to the request of Cote d'Ivoire to provide support in Youth Engagement in Institution Building and Public Services Delivery for Sustainable Development After the Pandemic (CD#4162).

**Objective:** The overall objective of the activity was to enhance the capacities of government officials working for and with youth as well as the capacities of youth-led civil society to contribute

actively to support the implementation of the SDGs, through more effective institutions and efficient public services delivery after the pandemic. Specific objectives were: (i) to reinforce the role of youth-led civil society organizations in strengthening public institutions and services delivery and mitigating the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic; (ii) to enhance public officials' understanding of how to harness the energy and productivity of the younger generation to support the achievement of the SDGs; and (iii) to support youth organisations to develop their capacity to intervene and contribute to their communities after the pandemic.

**Outcomes and Participants' Feedback:** The working group discussions focused on four specific themes: (i) employment and digital transformation; (ii) climate change and risk management; (iii) social cohesion, tolerance and solidarity; and (iv) peace, security and a culture of non-violence. Specific recommendations the participants made for action include: 1) Reinforce internship programs for graduates in companies to ease their entry into the labour market; 2) Strengthen young people's knowledge of DRR and climate change; 3) Youth organisations should play a role in preventing and combating fake news and disinformation; 4) Provide support to young people in difficult socio-economic situations to avoid their recruitment into extremist and violent groups.

### 3. SDG16 Conference 2022 – People-centred governance in a post-pandemic world

#### **Objective:**

The overall theme of the 2022 Conference was People-centred governance in a post-pandemic world. The 2022 Conference examined how COVID-19 has contributed to the root causes and drivers of conflict and instability, challenged the delivery of public services, threatened the rule of law and increased inequality and exclusion. The Conference was held in a hybrid format, in-person in Rome, Italy, and online.

The objective of the SDG 16 Conference 2022 was to support the reflection and actions of the international community on issues related to SDG 16 by facilitating inclusive stock-taking and dialogues on the challenges and opportunities for furthering people-centred governance in post-pandemic world. The Conference deliberations provided a space for governments and communities working on SDG 16 to continue to reflect on the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic in their areas of work and identify promising avenues for progress. In doing so, the Conference continues to play the role of an annual hub on SDG 16. The Conference through its outcome document, helps inform the HLPF and serves to influence collaborations and programmes of work going forward.

## Strengthening the capacity of civil servants in Bhutan to develop a public service training assessment framework

### CHALLENGE

The Royal Civil Service Commission (RCSC) decided to implement a set of minimum mandatory training (MMT) for the professional and management category (PMC) and executives to strengthen civil servants' capacity to deliver on the SDGs. These trainings were designed to focus on the basic leadership and management skills required at each position level. Four levels of MMT training for PMC are targeted to develop five key capabilities and 26 key competencies through a blend of 15 programs. Accordingly, RCSC developed new curricula based on five capabilities and 26 competencies derived from the Leadership Capability Framework, Competency-Based Framework, and behavior indicators for each position level in the civil service. However, RCSC faced challenges in identifying assessors and developing assessment tools and methods as well as assessment guides to evaluate the learning outcomes for each participant.

### SUPPORT PROVIDED

In 2022, UN DESA organized a peer-to-peer international workshop on public service training assessment frameworks for strengthening the capacities of public servants to implement the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The international workshop was a follow-up activity to the UN DESA's Development Account Project 1819G on "Institutional arrangements for policy integration, coordination, and stakeholder engagement in SDG implementation and reviews in Asia and the Pacific." The event was conducted virtually through the Zoom platform and attended by government officials from Bhutan, as well as international experts and officials from participating countries. The workshop aimed to strengthen civil servants' capacities in Bhutan, leading to the development of a public service training assessment framework for the Royal Government of Bhutan. In addition, the workshop provided a platform for practitioners and decision-makers of the RCSC of Bhutan and its affiliated institutes to learn lessons from international good practices. The invited panelists shared knowledge about various frameworks and approaches to enhancing training effectiveness through assessing learning outcomes while focusing on implementing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

### APPROACH ADOPTED

The workshop aimed at supporting the Royal Government of Bhutan to develop a national public service training assessment framework (PSTAF). A 7-step process was emphasized to facilitate the

development of a PSTAF comprising: 1. Establishing the context; 2. Creating an infrastructure for assessment; 3. Defining the Mission of the Programme; 4. Developing the Programme Learning Outcomes; 5. Identifying assessment categories, methods, and tools; 6. Aligning instructional strategies to assessment strategies and 7. Monitoring, review, and utilization of assessments.

### RESULTS

The workshop was attended by 102 participants from six countries and various UN entities, of which 68 government officials were from Bhutan. A post-event evaluation survey was carried out among participants from Bhutan. Forty (40) evaluation responses from participants from Bhutan were collected following the workshop. In total, 97.5 percent of attendees expressed satisfaction with the workshop. 65% of participants reported being extremely satisfied, while 32.5% reported being somewhat satisfied. 30% of attendees indicated they are somewhat likely to put what they learned in the workshop to use, while 70% said they are very likely to do so. Following the workshop, the Royal Civil Service Commission identified a course of action and potential next steps, which included:

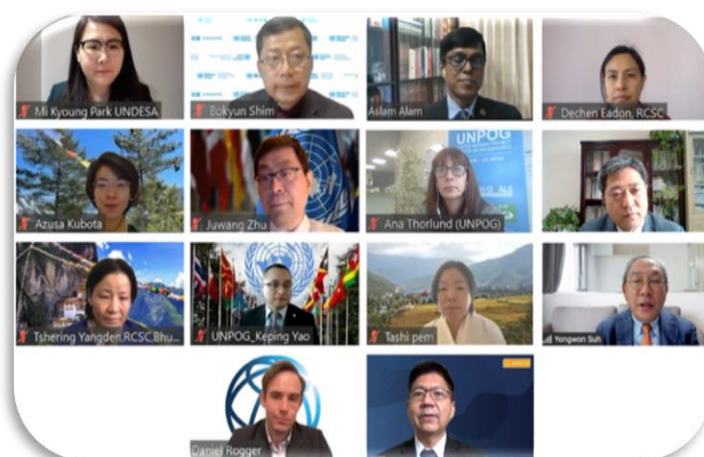
- Actions relating to talent management programmes, such as preparing lower-level executives for current roles, functions, and duties through professional programmes, and preparing managers/leaders for higher-level or new roles through leadership programmes.
- Designing fit-for-purpose programmes addressing both individual and organizational competencies.
- Strengthening development centers focusing on learning outcome assessments, assessment framework, and integration of assessment reports in personnel management.
- Upscaling examination centers to assessment centers focusing on competent assessors, internal or external, and developing a leadership assessment framework.

### LESSONS LEARNED

To make institutions effective, accountable, and inclusive, as elaborated in SDG 16, public administration systems must define new competency frameworks that can advance the principles of the 2030 Agenda and the principles of effective governance for sustainable development across the public service and ensure that they are put into practice. Strengthened institutional capacities to deliver relevant training programs are also needed to implement the SDGs. The latter should focus on encouraging new mindsets, competencies, behaviors, and new ways of working together across organizational boundaries. Training should be designed to be engaging, given the team structure in which the trainee works. It is essential to plan and strategize the training programs and link or integrate training interventions with other HR policies and systems like performance management and career progression. The translation of training into improvements in the functioning of the public sector requires going beyond knowledge acquisition. The government needs to identify the correct assessment principles and tools to assess the impact of different training programs. Competency-based training needs assessment is one of the most critical determinants of the success of training programs. Training assessments should be developed to assess the knowledge and skills acquired and whether the training and follow-up actions helped instill new values and mindsets, leading to expected institutional behaviors. The evaluation of the training's efficacy must follow the trainee

back into the public service and assess the extent to which the targeted processes or procedures are changing.



### Strengthened Capacities of Trainers to Conduct Trainings on Effective National to Local Public Governance for SDG Implementation in Cambodia

#### SUPPORT PROVIDED

At the request of the National School of Local Administration (NASLA) of Ministry of Interior, Royal Government of Cambodia, UN DESA/UNPOG of DPIDG, with the support of the UN Resident Coordinator Office in Cambodia and the UNDP in Cambodia, organized a five-days Training of Trainers (TOT) Workshop on “Effective National to Local Public Governance for SDG Implementation in Cambodia”, from 10 to 17 May 2022. The TOT workshop was based on the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs - Training of Trainers Toolkit on “Effective National to Local Public Governance for SDG Implementation.” The TOT workshop was attended by 17 trainers from the Ministry of Planning, NASLA, General Department of Administration, Phnom Penh Capital Administration and Siem Reap Provincial Administration of the Royal Government of Cambodia.

#### RESULTS

The workshop resulted in a Roadmap for capacity development on effective national to local governance based on the 5-day TOT workshop. NASLA will adapt the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs developed by UN DESA to the Cambodian context and collaborate with UN DESA, UNRCO,

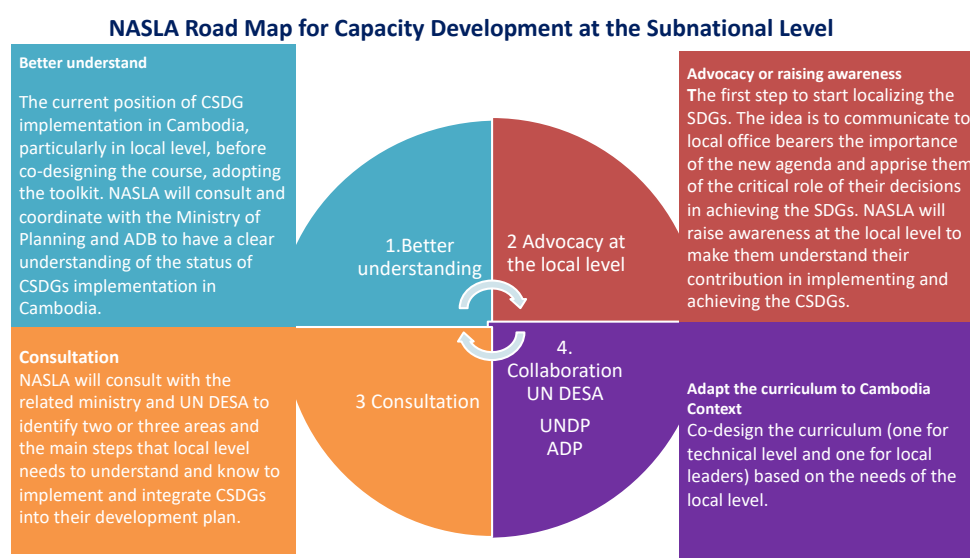

UNDP, and ADB to co-design the curriculum based on the needs of the local level. NASLA committed to organizing the first training by 2023. NASLA will consult and coordinate with the Ministry of Planning to clearly understand the status of the Cambodian SDGs (CSDGs) implementation. NASLA will also raise awareness of the CSDGs at the local level and integrate CSDGs into their development plan.

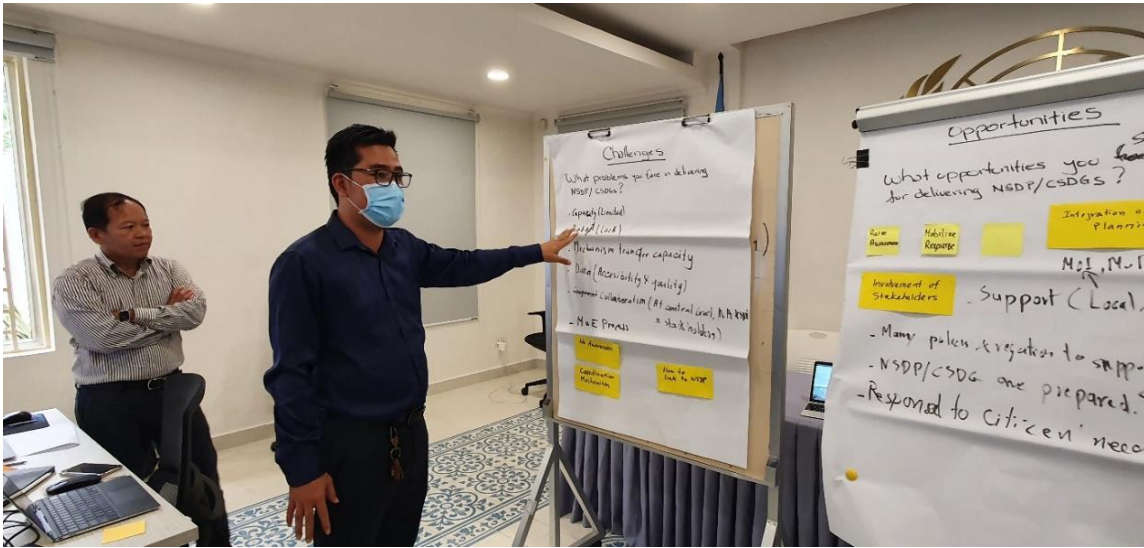
### LESSONS LEARNED

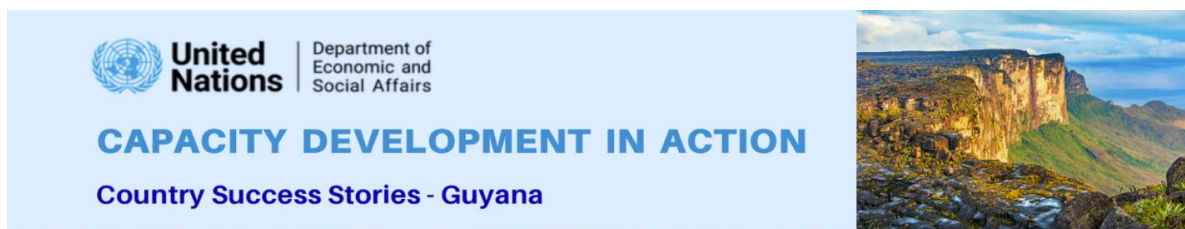
Participants mentioned the following as key outcomes: enhanced understanding of the Cambodian SDGs Framework 2016–2030 (CSDGs) and how it is implemented at the local level; enhanced knowledge of the importance of applying the principles of effective governance at all levels to achieve the 2030 Agenda and of whole-of-government and whole-of-society approaches; and strengthened capacity to identify various innovative financing mechanisms to advance local SDG implementation. The workshop was very well received by the participants. Overall, 94% of participants were entirely or mostly satisfied with the training, and 88% would recommend the training to their colleagues.

### **Development of a Roadmap for Public Sector Transformation and Establishment of An Inter-ministerial Committee for Innovation, Digital Government and Changing Mindsets to Achieve the Sustainable Development Goals in Guyana**

#### **CHALLENGE**

The vision for Guyana is to be a fully modernized and digitalized country. Guyana also aims to transform its economy for future generations. Digital should be at the center of its transformation. The latter will require new people's mindsets, an understanding of the required changes, and a willingness to learn, re-learn, and adapt. Changes in culture, mindsets, communication, empowerment of staff, institutions, and processes are needed to achieve Guyana's vision. Challenges include (i) using digital platforms for education at all levels and moving forward to achieve the SDGs; (ii) increasing food production, creating new markets for farmers, increasing exports, and decreasing imports to move forward financially; (iii) digitalizing agriculture; (iv) promoting e-governance across different ministries and digitizing public services; and (v) strengthening systems for appraisals, transfers, and promotions.

#### **SUPPORT PROVIDED**

In 2021, the Ministry of Public Service of Guyana requested UN DESA to provide support in developing capacities for public sector transformation through the promotion of innovation, digital government and changing mindsets. To respond to the request, a workshop on "Innovation, Digital Government, and Changing Mindsets for Public Sector Transformation in Guyana to Achieve the Sustainable Development Goals" was organized in March 2022. The capacity development workshop, which was held over the period of two weeks, was attended by around seventy Permanent and Deputy Permanent Secretaries, Regional Executive Officers, and Chief Executive Officers from across the Government of Guyana.

#### **APPROACH ADOPTED**

The approach included adapting to the local context the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs' Toolkits on changing mindsets and on innovation for public service delivery. The workshop included presentations by experts, interactive activities, group discussions, and innovative practices in support of peer learning. Participants engaged in a co-creation process, working together on identifying strengths, challenges, recommendations, actions, and priorities to inform a roadmap for public sector transformation, innovation, digital government, and changing mindsets in Guyana. The 11 principles of effective governance for sustainable development, developed by the UN Committee

of Experts on Public Administration, were presented as a framework for change. The UN DESA digital government capability assessment (DGCA) and institutional readiness assessment for policy coherence, which are part of the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs available on the UNPAN, were used to identify institutional gaps and strengths. The workshop introduced the following key structural building blocks that are helpful for governments when embarking on public sector transformation: 1. Political commitment; 2. transformational leadership and changing mindsets; 3. institutional coordination and system thinking; 4. coherence between national and local/regional levels; 5. organizational structures and processes; and 6. financing 7. Digital technology and data management; 8. stakeholder engagement; and 9. monitoring, reporting, and evaluation (including mechanisms for citizen feedback). In addition, activities on changing mindsets were undertaken to identify challenges and opportunities related to promoting a collaborative mindset, an evidence-based mindset, an inclusive mindset to leave no one behind, an innovation and experimental mindset, and a digital data mindset. Finally, the challenges identified by the participants were utilized as key elements of an action plan to develop a roadmap and recommendations on how to promote public sector transformation in Guyana.

### RESULTS

UN DESA/DPIDG's support resulted in the agreement among the various institutions including ministries, authorities, regional council, etc. to establish a new institutional arrangement for public sector transformation, i.e., an Inter-ministerial Steering Committee in Guyana. The recommendations and roadmap that were co-created by the permanent secretaries of all ministers during the workshop will be presented to the Prime Minister's Office for further action. Participants agreed that all Permanent Secretaries, Deputy Permanent Secretaries, Regional Executive Officers, Heads of Departments will have a role in the strategy development and implementation efforts as the Ministry of Public Service will aim to lead in the formation of sub-working groups of the committee that will respond to sector specific/priority driven areas identified during the workshop. Key partners were identified as the Office of the Prime Minister, National Data Management Authority that has responsibility for telecommunication and the ICT sector, especially in view of ongoing efforts to launch a revised ICT Strategy for Guyana, as well as CARICOM and CARICAD; in addition to UN DESA and the UN Resident Coordinator in Guyana. According to the Ministry of Public Service, the Workshop has started a journey toward "exceptional things for the public service as there is an abundance of resources that need to be supported by an advanced/modernized public service framework."

### LESSONS LEARNED

- **Strong ownership and commitment from the government** as well as strong collaboration with the Caribbean Centre for Development Administration (CARICAD), and the Caribbean Community (CARICOM), and with the support of the UN Resident Coordinator Office in Guyana, was instrumental to the success of the workshop.

- Adopting a **whole-of-government approach**, involving several stakeholders, including ministries, authorities, regional councils, marketing corporation, etc. was critical in achieving the expected results.
- **Peer-to-peer learning** on challenges, trends, innovative practices, and lessons learned on how to promote public sector transformation in Guyana through inter-ministerial dialogue was essential in creating a Roadmap for public sector transformation.

### Development of a Roadmap and Institutional Arrangements for the Review and Updating of Jamaica's Integrated Coastal Zone Management Policy and its Enabling Framework

#### CHALLENGE

Jamaica's mountainous topography, coastal character, and distribution of resource endowments have influenced settlement patterns, livelihoods strategies, and patterns of economic development. As a SIDS, Jamaica is highly dependent on the services, resources, and opportunities provided by, and in, its coastal and ocean spaces. The Council on Ocean and Coastal Zone Management (COCZM) was established in 1998 with a mandate to define the national policy for ocean and coastal zone management. Jamaica's Ocean and Coastal Zone Management (OCZM) Policy has not had the intended impact due to policy implementation barriers created by inadequate resourcing, lack of legal standing, and weak institutional arrangements. The need for enhanced enabling arrangements for the implementation of the policy are evident.

There was broad agreement that the national OCZM policy must be revisited and updated. A considerable amount of time has elapsed since the policy was promulgated in 2022. In this time, new policies, development perspectives, and paradigms have come to the fore. The updating and revision of the OCZM Policy must take these developments into account while ensuring coherence among policies and sectoral interests that impact the coastal zone. Ensuring that policy coherence is achieved in the revision of the OCZM policy required the introduction and employment of systems

thinking. This is critical for effective policy design. As a process, systems thinking can facilitate the meaningful engagement of all OCZM stakeholders, enhance transparency, understanding, and accountability in decision-making, catalyze stakeholder buy-in and ownership of the intended policy direction and outcomes, and ensure alignment with the national Vision 2030 development goals.

### **SUPPORT PROVIDED**

In 2018, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade (MFAFT) requested UN DESA's SIDS Unit to provide support in developing their capacity to design and implement appropriate enabling legal, institutional and policy frameworks to grow sustainable ocean-based economies and to derive economic benefits from harnessing the productive potential of their ocean spaces. In the process, the project aimed at eliciting recommendations from a variety of OCZM stakeholders on the institutional capabilities (experience, aptitudes, proficiency, and competencies) required to effectively coordinate and implement the review and revision of Jamaica's national Ocean Coastal Zone Management (OCZM) Policy. In response to this request UN DESA organised a programme of consultation and assessment through its Development Account Project DA 1819b entitled "Bridging capacity gaps in the implementation of the 2030 Agenda, with a particular focus on SDG 14 and SDG 16".<sup>1</sup> The project team, including DPIDG and DSDG of UN DESA, engaged with a wide range of stakeholders and provided guidance and recommendations on the institutional capabilities (experience, aptitudes, proficiency, and competencies) required, and available opportunities, for effectively coordinating and implementing the review and revision of Jamaica's national Ocean Coastal Zone Management (OCZM) Policy and establishing its enabling framework.

### **APPROACH ADOPTED**

The approach adopted included 4 phases as follows (see Figure 1 below): Phase I: The 2019 Baseline Assessment produced a roadmap to guide the review and rationalisation of the governance and enabling arrangements for Jamaica's OCZM Policy and sector. The roadmap was endorsed by Jamaica's National Council for Ocean and Coastal Zone management (NCOCZM), the GoJ's OCZM coordinating body; Phase 2: In keeping with the recommendations of the roadmap, UN DESA supported the development of an M&E framework for the OCZM Policy, and a review and rationalisation of the national OCZM Policy, legislation, and institutional arrangements. The main output of the review and rationalisation exercise were the recommendation for the institutional options for OCZM Coordinating Entity and OCZM Implementation Entity; Phase 3: UN DESA's support to the consultative process for reviewing the institutional options for OCZM Implementing Entity (IE) and OCZM Coordinating Entity (CE). Phase 4: The operationalisation of the institutional arrangements for OCZM to set the stage for the review and updating of the OCZM Policy and the development of dedicated ICZM legislation.

### **RESULTS**

The project resulted in the following outcomes:

- Baseline Assessment of OCZM sector and policy.
- Revised M&E Framework for the OCZM Policy.
- Analysis of the governance and enabling environment, and institutional arrangements, for the revision and updating of the OCZM Policy.
- Options for institutional models for coordinating and implementing the policy review and revision process.
- Stakeholder recommendations for the institutional models for coordinating and implementing the revision and updating of the OCZM Policy.
- A sustainability strategy to support the implementation of the revised and updated OCZM Policy incorporating policy coherence and systems thinking.
- Commitment from the UN RR to coordinate support and input from development partners for the revision and updating of the OCZM Policy.

### LESSONS LEARNED

The consultative process undertaken by UN DESA has been central to its success. Consultations with the PIOJ, MFAFT, and NEPA facilitated early adjustments to project assumptions. A formal and explicit connection between economic and environmental benefits would create potential access to innovative financing opportunities. Connecting the OCZM Policy revision and updating process to the Blue Economy discussions would help to advance the integration of environmental and governance issues in economic and social decision-making processes. The national consultation process has proven to be very meaningful, ensuring that the review and assessment of Jamaica's OCZM policy and sector has been *facilitated* by UN DESA but *owned* and *directed* by the Government of Jamaica and Jamaica's OCZM stakeholders.

## Strengthened inter-ministerial coordination and digitalization for effective One Door Service Centers in Lao PDR

### CHALLENGE

In 2006, the Lao People's Democratic Republic (PDR) established One Door Service Centers (ODSCs). The ODSCs were envisioned as "one-stop shops" designed to meet citizens' multiple needs for public services. By 2014, when there were about 17 ODSCs in operation, a UN Lao PDR evaluation team reported that none of the 17 centers functioned as planned, and some did not exist at all. Others provided very limited services. No standard fee table, valid across the country, existed for the

services they were supposed to provide. The evaluation team concluded that the impact of the ODSCs was practically nonexistent at that time. The awareness level of the ODSC's existence among citizens was also low. By 2021, the number of ODSCs had reached 47. However, it was widely recognized that ODSCs were not functioning effectively. The key challenge that impeded effective, inclusive, and accountable services of ODSCs was the lack of coordination among the ministries and between the central and local levels to work in a coherent manner.

### **SUPPORT PROVIDED**

In 2019, the Ministry of Home Affairs (MOHA), which oversees the development of ODSCs in Lao PDR, requested UN DESA's support to ensure more coordinated and effective public service delivery through the ODSCs and to pilot a smart ODSC in the country. UN DESA, through its Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG) and its Project Office on Governance (UNPOG), worked closely with the Government of Lao PDR and the UN Resident Coordinator Office in Lao PDR to promote capacities for inter-ministerial coordination. To respond to the request, several activities were organized, including two inter-ministerial technical workshops on implementing the ODSCs in Lao PDR in 2021. The Project also developed an Inter-Ministerial dialogue to mainstream ODSCs across the country with the presence of the MOHA's Minister and other senior civil servants from all key ministries and governmental agencies from national and local levels.

### **APPROACH ADOPTED**

Through strong collaboration with the Government of Lao PDR and other UN partners on the ground, the approach included promoting peer-to-peer learning on effective service delivery through one-stop-shops with the participation of several countries that shared their experiences, including the Republic of Korea, Singapore, Azerbaijan, Vietnam, and Bangladesh, along with a host of international experts on public service delivery. The principles of effective governance for sustainable development, developed by the UN Committee of Experts on Public Administration, were presented as a framework for change. UN DESA's Institutional Readiness Assessment for Policy Coherence, available on the UNPAN, was also used to facilitate the identification of institutional gaps and strengths in Lao PDR to deliver effective services. A handbook on "How to Design and Implement One-Stop-Shops to Promote Better Service Delivery and Implement the Sustainable Development Goals" was developed, and key elements of an action plan were designed and used during the various workshops to facilitate the co-creation of a roadmap and recommendations on how to make ODSCs more effective and inclusive and establish an inter-ministerial coordinating committee for integrated service delivery.

### **RESULTS**

Following a landmark decision, as highlighted by the Minister of MOHA, UN DESA/DPIDG's support resulted in the agreement among all ministries to establish an Inter-ministerial Steering Committee for effective service delivery and the effective implementation of the Presidential Decree 02 for effective services. The recommendations and roadmap that were co-created by all deputy ministers during the workshop were presented to the Prime Minister's Office for further consideration.

The workshop had a historical significance since it was the first time since the establishment of ODSCs that deputy ministers across all the ministries and key personnel in the Prime Minister Office came together to discuss how to improve (a) organizational structures and processes, (b) digital technology and data, and (c) stakeholders' engagement for effective service delivery. In 2020, UN DESA also supported the design of a roadmap, workflows and the launch of an online application for a Smart ODSC in Saysetha District ODSC. Technical cooperation assistance included (a) organizing four workshops (one peer-to-peer learning international workshop and three national workshops at various levels) and (b) developing a roadmap and action plan for coordinated ODSCs. In 2021, a historic event was organized with UN DESA's support to virtually gather all the 49 ODSCs in Lao PDR for the first time to discuss how to work together in designing uniform standards in ODSC service delivery. Additionally, through UN DESA's support, in cooperation with the UN Country Team and with MOHA, the Roadmap for Smart ODSCs was produced and adopted at the local level by Saysetha District ODSC. An action plan, including a dashboard and pilot project for the Saysetha District ODSC was also developed in 2021. This cooperation was anchored as part of the National Governance Public Administration Reform Programme (NGPAR) in Lao PDR, in partnership with UNDP.

### LESSONS LEARNED

- ① Strong **ownership** and commitment from the government counterpart was key to success as well as strong collaboration with the UN system on the ground.
- ② Adopting a **whole-of-government** approach, involving 18 ministries in Lao PDR, was critical in achieving the expected results.
- ③ **Peer-to-peer learning** on challenges, trends, innovative practices, and lessons learned on how to promote integrated public service delivery and the development of **methodologies** for assessing institutional gaps and strengths, and action planning were instrumental.
- ④ Effective institutional coordination, both vertical and horizontal, and support of key ministries, including the highest political authority, are prerequisites for successful implementation of the ODSC system.
- ⑤ The methodologies adopted in Lao PDR can be useful to other countries. The institutional readiness assessment toolkit for One-Stop-Shops and the action-planning process applied in Lao PDR be relevant to other jurisdictions as well.

### **Enhanced policy coherence for the SDGs through integrated assessments & new institutional arrangements in Namibia**

#### **CHALLENGE**

The Harambe Prosperity Plan II (2021-2025), launched by the President HE Dr. Hage Geingob in 2021, has the objective of strengthening Namibia's governance architecture. The plan is a set of targeted policy programmes consisting of prioritized short to medium term goals and strategic actions to accelerate national development. Namibia is committed to incorporating the sustainable development goals into the National Development Plans by adopting policies, strategies and organizational reforms that can enhance sustainable development. One of Namibia's challenges was the absence of a whole of government approach across various sectors, especially in the water, energy and land sectors, all impacted by or having an impact on climate change. To overcome this challenge, the Government of Namibia requested support with the development of a roadmap for strengthening institutional coordination mechanisms.

#### **SUPPORT PROVIDED**

DPIDG and EAPD presented the Climate Land Energy and Water Systems (CLEWS) methodology to help strengthen capacities in support of the Namibian UNPAF (predecessor of the UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework). The CLEWS is a customizable modelling tool designed for integrated assessment of resource systems. It is designed to help identify and quantify the trade-offs and synergies that may exist in pursuit of policy goals in each area. DPIDG would support Namibia in establishing a legacy framework to embed the methodology into the national development policy planning process. It was acknowledged that CLEWS could provide a framework for modelling and revising Namibia's Nationally determined contributions (NDCs) as an integral part of Harambee Prosperity Plan II since coherent policies require coherent institutional arrangements. DPIDG supported the government in establishing an institutional framework to embed the CLEWS methodology into the national development policy planning process.

#### **APPROACH ADOPTED**

Several consultations were held to ensure the involvement of the appropriate stakeholders in the project. Broad project involvement was thereby ensured and a team of national stakeholders, coordinated by the National Planning Commission (the authority responsible for national planning) was formed including representation from academia. Focal points were appointed from each stakeholder institution and a technical working group was established to undertake training, model

development and analysis. DPIDG took part virtually in the hybrid induction workshop that was organized from 7-11 of February 2022 in Swakopmund to launch the capacity development project to support coherence in policy formulation in the areas of climate, land, energy and water systems in Namibia with a view to strengthening one of the main economic targets, namely its agriculture sector. During the launching mission, discussions were held with the Executive Directors or their delegates from the National Planning Commission (NPC, CLEWS focal point), the Ministry of Agriculture, Water and Land Reform (MAWLR), the National Statistics Agency (NSA) and the Ministry of Mines and Energy (MME) to seek their commitment to embed CLEWS into their national and sectoral planning process. A tier system that is composed of three relevant target groups in the implementation of the CLEWS methodology (see below figure), was presented and adopted during the launching workshop. After the launching workshop, UN DESA helped to implement the tier system that defines roles and responsibilities, activities and capacities required to use CLEWS. An inter-institutional Technical Working group (tier 1 and 2 of the tier system) was established and worked with UN staff from the RC office, UN ECA, UN DESA, and external experts to develop and apply a CLEWS model tailored to the unique national circumstances.

The team committed to bi-weekly meetings, was able to work efficiently in a remote format and took ownership of the work which proceeded according to the agreed plan with only minor delays. Over a

period of about 6 months, they were able to acquire the skills to operate CLEWs models, develop a Namibia CLEWs model and conduct policy analysis in priority areas. In parallel with the capacity building process on CLEWS modeling, a plan for institutionalization of the CLEWs approach was developed and vetted with national stakeholders.

DPIDG supported the government with the establishment of functional inter-ministerial/ inter-institutional team(s) that can respond to policy-related analytical needs as they arise and to develop institutional coordination mechanisms that can resolve conflicts or inconsistencies between the relevant stakeholders. Moreover, DPIDG set steps on how to address the RCO's interest to use the CLEWS integrated assessment as input into the CCA that will be developed in the course of 2024. The RCO also expressed interest in incorporating CLEWS into the new UNSDCF to ensure ongoing access to advisory support. DPIDG developed options for institutional arrangements to embed CLEWS into the national policy planning process based on a good analysis of the Namibian development planning process and in close collaboration with NPC to ensure its ownership. The validity of the options was discussed and amended during the mission in July. During the mission DPIDG also met with the Vice-chancellor of the University of Namibia (UNAM) and the technical experts to discuss the details for the establishment of a CLEWS Lab, a resource center for integrated modelling and a repository of multisectoral data use for conducting robust analytical work to inform sectoral, intersectoral and national policies. This CLEWS Lab would serve as a training facility resource center for experts and analysts who attend and acquire the CLEWS modeling training and other complementary policy analysis and planning models. Each participating institution will assign 2-4 experts who shall be trained in CLEWS modeling and will be resource person or trainers that cascade the CLEWS modeling training to the second- generation groups. A Post Doc and Master students would offer Training of trainers to the technical experts of the ministries and would run and interpret models in support of the sectoral and national strategies. The policy priorities would be defined by the senior officials through the policy makers.

### RESULTS

Namibia's Government has endorsed the continued use of CLEWs as part of their national planning process, as well as the adoption of a roadmap for institutionalization. A workshop to present and validate the findings to senior leadership took place on 23-24 November 2022. UN DESA ensured ownership in the validation workshop by letting technical experts from some ministries propose how CLEWS could add value for their own sectoral strategies. The RC for Namibia will use CLEWS to inform their upcoming CCA and develop their new UNSDCF. A critical component in the implementation of CLEWS will be the right selection of technical experts for each ministry, including continuous training and exercises.

### LESSONS LEARNED

DPIDG's role was often about facilitating the communication among decision makers and modelling experts, working in different sectors. Overall, the COVID pandemic has reinforced the lack of absorptive capacity and technical weaknesses in the respective countries. Strengthening policy coherence requires more than capacity development in the field of quantitative modelling. Even if

there is an interest in principle in enhancing policy coherence, the involved ministries all need to be convinced and there needs to be enough absorptive capacity as well as governance capacity to implement this. Moreover, all approaches promoting policy coherence are likely to make the institutional policy making process initially more complex. A thorough understanding of the policy planning cycle in country helped to understand where CLEWS could be included. It also required many discussions with stakeholders involved in policy design and implementation in CLEWS-related ministries and collaboration with RC's offices and a national consultant.



### **Mainstreamed Training on Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Achieve the SDGs in the courses of the Pakistan's National School of Public Policy**

#### **CHALLENGE**

Pakistan has been committed to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development since its inception in 2015. "The country is advancing towards its commitment to the 2030 Agenda by working to strengthen institutional mechanisms, enhance awareness, create productive partnerships, and improve coordination... Strengthening institutions, ensuring meritocracy, and introducing transparency at all levels are essential for translating its political vision into reality through efficient and effective management of available resources and improving service delivery. A cornerstone of implementing the SDG goals is building on existing alliances and forging new partnerships, leveraging technology, and mobilizing innovative sources of finance." [1] This is particularly relevant, especially since the COVID-19 pandemic has unleashed an unprecedented crisis, causing further disruption to SDG progress, with the world's poorest and most vulnerable affected the most. A transformative and people oriented public service is critical to overcoming the crisis and delivering on the SDGs. However, to undertake the necessary transformation in public institutions, it was crucial to have a comprehensive vision that included strong public servants' capacities at all levels, including innovative mindsets and new behaviors to achieve significant improvements in policy implementation and to solve "wicked" problems.

#### **SUPPORT PROVIDED**

In 2021, the National School of Public Policy (NSPP), which is the most prestigious institution for in-service training of civil servants in Pakistan, expressed interest in working with UN DESA to hold a pilot training program at one of their NSPPs. The latter holds the "National Management Course" (NMC) for senior-ranking government officials. The objective of the NMC is to enhance participants'

understanding of strategic management, leadership, and governance and their relevance and application to public policy formulation and implementation.

In light of the above, UN DESA, in collaboration with the UN Resident Coordinator Office in Pakistan, organized a hybrid training workshop on changing mindsets. A mindset change is needed to manage a transformation that would drive improved service delivery. Transformation is expected to be a long-term journey and needs to involve all levels of civil servants. Given the workshop's success, the National Institute of Management (NIM), a constituent unit of the National School of Public Policy (NSPP), requested UN DESA's assistance in organizing and delivering training activities to raise awareness of the 2030 Agenda and promote mindset and behavioral change among public servants for SDG implementation. Given this request, UN DESA/DPIDG, in collaboration with UNRCO, organized a "Training of Trainers" to train staff from NIM and NSPP, who in turn trained their civil servants. UN DESA staff helped NIM design the two-day workshops on Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Realize the 2030 Agenda in Pakistan. The latter would then be embedded into NSPP school courses. The course aimed to equip public servants with innovative mindsets and behaviors to better address current and future challenges. After the Training of Trainers, NMI, in collaboration with the UNRCO and with the support of UNDESA, organized successful workshops on August 21 and 22, and November 28 and 29, 2022.

### APPROACH ADOPTED

The training workshops were based on the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs Toolkit on Changing Mindsets developed by UN DESA. They were co-designed with the UNRCO and the NSPP and were focused on a specific complex problem for the country. The Indus River Basin Case Study for a basic ecological restoration was chosen as an essential topic for Pakistan. Indeed, the Indus River Basin faces several issues, including water security in the transboundary basin and the importance of collaboration to address the impacts of climate change, among other aspects. Participants engaged in interactive discussions on key mindsets needed to solve some complex issues of the case study. Emphasis was given to nurturing innovative mindsets to enhance vertical and horizontal coordination and effective and inclusive delivery of services. This was done by focusing on key mindsets such as the leadership, collaboration, innovation, and digital mindsets.

### RESULTS

As a result of the training, NSPP has mainstreamed the course on changing mindsets into its curriculum. One hundred thirty-four participants were trained. Outcomes from the Workshops highlighted that sharing experiences and cross-learning on innovative mindsets and behaviours can help public servants be more effective in creating solutions and implementing policies that could address current and future problems. Moreover, by providing advisory support and developing and piloting new methodologies, the training on changing mindsets in public institutions to achieve the SDGs is being mainstreamed in the courses of Pakistan's National School of Public Policy. Participants mentioned that the toolkit on changing mindset "provides an opportunity to learn new perspectives on mindsets and its application can lead to a personal growth and achievement of the organizational object." Also, participants mentioned that they would initiate changes in their

organization irrespective of their working environment and would try to make their organization a learning institution. In addition, they mentioned they would change their own attitude as far as possible. Primarily they will encourage the use of ICTs, collaboration, and teamwork".

### LESSONS LEARNED

- Strong leadership, ownership, and commitment from the Pakistan National School of Public Policy counterpart
- A hybrid approach where the RCO was on-site to facilitate the event, and UN DESA staff facilitated the event remotely. The hybrid style was a critical component for the successful implementation of the Workshop. After the first Workshop, the organization of the Training of Trainers allowed NSPP to take full ownership of the design and implementation of the Workshop on Changing Mindsets in Public Institutions to Realize the 2030 Agenda in Pakistan.
- Importance of raising awareness of the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs among civil servants, as well as promoting innovative tools and practices in the public sector.
- The toolkit on changing mindset is a powerful toolkit that could help civil servants be change-makers. Civil servants are well-positioned to create change by turning ideas and visions into a course of action that generates the desired outcome. This is particularly important, especially now in this very fast-changing environment. "Doing" is vital because our learners experience and learn from their actions' effects.

## Establishment of a Roadmap for Effective National to Local Institutional Coordination and Monitoring Mechanisms for NSDP/SDG Implementation in Vanuatu

### CHALLENGE

Vanuatu - with over 60 inhabited islands - represents many of the development challenges facing small island developing nations. The achievement of the SDGs is a major task for the country, particularly for the many remote communities spread across the archipelago. Development success depends greatly on enhancing national to local institutional coordination and improving monitoring mechanisms. These are also essential to implementing the country's highest level policy framework: the National Sustainable Development Plan (NSDP) also known as Vanuatu 2030 The People's Plan

– and the government’s decentralization policy. Given Vanuatu’s current socio-political environment, economic context and most importantly the natural setting, Vanuatu needs to be more innovative, pragmatic, responsive and creative to bring effective and efficient public service delivery and development directly to citizens. In this context, despite their large and increasing responsibilities, provincial and municipal administrations have relatively few trained staff, often just a single planner and a finance officer who also struggle with both physical and electronic communications. Because of these difficulties, Provincial Officers have, to date, had relatively little involvement in the national government’s extensive efforts to develop and monitor the plans and policies designed to enable Vanuatu to achieve the vision of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) which is the overarching policy framework for achieving a ‘stable sustainable and prosperous’ Vanuatu. These efforts are embodied in Vanuatu 2030, which is overseen by the Department of Strategic Policy Planning and Aid Coordination (DSPPAC) within the Prime Minister’s office.

### **SUPPORT PROVIDED**

In 2020, the Department of Strategic Policy, Planning and Aid Coordination (DSPPAC) within the Prime Minister’s office of the Government of the Republic of Vanuatu requested UN DESA to provide support in developing capacities for National to Local Coordination and Monitoring Mechanisms for the National Sustainable Development Plan. In response to this request, a workshop on “Enhancing National to Local Institutional Coordination and Monitoring Mechanisms for NSDP/SDG Implementation in Vanuatu” was organized in July 2022 in Port Vila. The capacity development workshop was hybrid with the participation of 40 in-person participants: 20 from the provincial level (Torba, Sanma, Penama, Malampa, Shefa, Tafea, Torba Provinces, and Lenakel Municipal Council), and 20 representatives from Line Ministries, the Country Coordination Specialist, UNDP in Vanuatu and UN DESA/DPIDG/UNPOG and SIDS Unit/UN DESA. Several speakers presented online via zoom.

### **APPROACH ADOPTED**

Through collaboration with the Department of Strategic Policy Planning and Aid Coordination (DSPPAC) within the Prime Minister’s office and with the support of UN DESA, through its Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG) and its Project Office on Governance (UNPOG), and in collaboration with the UN Resident Coordinator’s Office and UNDP, the workshop was conducted in July 2022 after a period of lockdown in the country due to COVID-19.

The approach used was to adapt the Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs toolkit on effective national to local governance developed by UN DESA. Participants discussed the challenges and opportunities faced by Provincial Administrators in Coordinating Multi-level Governance for sector cooperation. Also, the workshop included other national and international expert presentations, where participants focused on the monitoring and evaluation of the SDGs and learned about the Philippines’ experience with National to Local Institutional Coordination for NSDP/SDG Implementation. Challenges to decentralization were also discussed with emphasis on administrative, political, and financial challenges. Several examples from around the world of legal or other institutional arrangements between central and subnational governments for collaboration,

coordination, and consultation, as well as formal coordination and consultation mechanisms to integrate the priorities of subnational government entities into national policy/strategy formulation and planning processes, and for horizontal coordination at the regional and local levels were shared with the participants. Through plenary and group discussion, participants discussed the challenges in monitoring and reporting on the SDGs – including data collection and management, identified and formulated recommendations for the council of Ministers, and discussed areas and actions to integrate into the Provincial Actions Plans to implement the NSDP. During the Workshop, participants also engaged in group discussions to build synergies and partnerships between national and subnational levels for effective SDG implementation and to inform the DSPPAC and Provinces Road Map to accelerate action on Vanuatu 2030 – The People’s Plan (NSDP).

### RESULTS

UN DESA/DPIDG/UNPOG support resulted in an agreement on a set of recommendations to the Council of Ministers on enhancing national to local institutional coordination, and monitoring mechanisms and main recommendations for the provincial action plans to be implemented in coherence with the Nasara Sector Strategy 2022-2026 “Building Resilient Governance, Representation and Inclusion for a Safe, Secure and Prosperous Vanuatu”. Furthermore, there was consensus on a DSPPAC and Provinces Roadmap to accelerate the implementation of Vanuatu 2030 – The People’s Plan. The Roadmap includes 1) Policy Recommendations to the Council of Ministers to set up local institutional arrangements and governance frameworks to support the implementation of the NSDP; 2) Alignment of Provincial Plans with NSDP targets and indicators through raising awareness and review of Provincial Action Plans; 3) NSDP Monitoring and Evaluation System improved in Vanuatu through coordination across institutions; 4) Collaboration with UN DESA/UNPOG, UNDP to apply the toolkit on National to Local Coordination and Risk-Informed Governance to Vanuatu; 5) Delivery of UN DESA’s Curriculum on Governance.

### LESSONS LEARNED

There is a strong need to collaborate with the UN system and UN DESA in particular as per its comparative advantage and expertise in strengthening governance systems in Vanuatu at the local level, notably through the decentralization initiative driven by the current government. The localization of the SDGs requires strong capacity at the local level and there is a need to support such efforts.
